8. Major activities undertaken during 2017-18 to 2021-22 academic sessions:

<u>2017-18:</u>

- i. Awareness Drives among students were conducted in the University hostels and during NSS camps via interaction, presentation and distribution of brochures.
- ii. Prof. Monika Gupta interacted with students and talked to them about discrimination and its elimination during NSS special camps.

<u>2018-19</u>

A. Events organized:

- i. ADC updated the "Complaint form and detailed brochure" for the academic session 2018-19.
- ii. Participation in "Induction programmes for newly admitted undergraduate students" organized by different departments of the University, during August-September, 2018 to create awareness among the students regarding the scopes and functioning of ADC. Dr. Sudhir Kumar, and Dr. Vineet Maurya told the student of different department of Life Sciences about the ADC.
- iii. Participation in Induction programme conducted by IQAC, HNBGU in August, 2018.
- iv. Awareness about ADC among NSS volunteers, by Dr. Vineet Maurya, on National Unity Day celebration on 31st October, 2018, with the view that NSS volunteers will spread the message among other students of the University.
- v. Conduction of awareness programmes at various hostels of the University where the residents were informed about the functioning and purview of ADC.
- vi. Prof. Monika Gupta interacted with students and talked to them about discrimination and its elimination during NSS special camps.

B. Complaints/ Grievances received to ADC-HNBGU and their redressal

i. Two grievances were submitted to the ADC by Er. Rajenra Prasad (Junior Engineer, electrical Section) during 2018-19. The cases submitted to the ADC were resolved, by gathering information and clarifications from the concerned department of the university, and making suitable recommendation in each

<u>2019-20</u>

A. Events organized:

- i. ADC-HNBGU participated in the Induction programme for B.Sc. Ist semester students of Microbiology course on 11 Sep, 2019. *Dr. Sudhir Kumar*, represented ADC-HNBGU and told the newly admitted students of the course about importance and functioning of the ADC. *Dr. Vineet Maurya* (member, ADC-HNBGU) was also present during the event.
- ii. ADC-HNBGU created the awareness among the NSS- volunteers of Birla Campus Unit, HNBGU during their 7 days special camps (Boys Group: 30-05 Jan, 2020; Girls group: 24 Feb-01 March, 2020). *Dr. Vineet Kumar Maurya* from ADC-HNBGU participated in the camp to spread an awareness regarding equal and harmonous environment creating in the academic institutions and other places. How it can be achieved and how one should be vigilant about any sort of discrimination was told in detailed to the participants. *Dr. Sudhir Kumar*, (member, ADC-HNBGU) were also present during the event.
- iii. One day Webinar was organized by ADC-HNBGU in collaboration with UGC, New Delhi on 09 June 2020, on a very important topic "Gender Equality & Women's Rights". The program was conducted online meeting platform: Google meet (Meeting link: meet.google.com/khg-pkgf-eew). Women studies Centre and Sexual Harassment Cell of the University also participated in the program. Prof. Annapurna Nautiyal (Vice-Chancellor, HNBGU) made her presidential speech and congratulated the organizers for the event, Dr. (Mrs.) Archana Thakur, (Joint secretary, UGC, New Delhi), Prof. Rekha Pandey (University of Hyderabad), Prof. Gopal Krishna Thakur (MGAHVishvidyala, Wardha), Prof. Monika Gupta (Chair person, Anti-Discrimination Cell, HNBGU), Prof. Himanshu Baurai, (Chair person, Women Studies Centre, HNBGU) and Prof. Vineet Ghildiyal (Chair person, Sexual Harassment Cell, HNBGU) put their views on different aspects of Gender, equality and Women rights and told about various schemes being rung by Government of India in these regards. Prof. Seema Dhawan (Department of Education, HNBGU) conducted the programme along with Dr. Vineet K. Maurya (Member, Anti-Discrimination Cell, HNBGU)

and **Dr. Sudhir Kumar** (Member, Anti-Discrimination Cell, HNBGU). Approximately 120 participants participated in the event via online mode.

B. Complaints/ Grievances received to ADC-HNBGU and their redressal:

- i. On 01 Nov, 2019 three faculty member of Department of Zoology and Biotechnology (*Dr. Mamta Arya, Dr. Sudhir Kumar, Dr. Saurav Yadav* (Department of Zoology and Biotechnology) make a complaint regarding discrimination made to them in Ph.D. seats allotment. They said that a caste based discrimination has been made by the HOD by not allotting any Ph.D. seats to them, despite of their demand for the same, while all other faculty members have been allotted Ph.D. seat/s. ADC discussed the issue in its meeting and being one of the complainants, *Dr. Sudhir Kumar* did not participated in further progress of this matter. A letter was sent to *Prof. S. N. Bahuguna* (Campus Head) regarding his view point on the complaint and further a letter was sent to *Prof. B. S. Bisht* (Department Head) in response to reply made by *Prof. Bahuguna*. A further correspondence to *Prof. Bahuguna* was made and the matter is still unresolved.
- ii. On 12 June, 2020 *Nivedita* (Unit President) and *Kamlesh Negi* (Secretary) Student's Federation of India (SFI), HNBGU made a complaint to ADC regarding misbehave made by Chief warden of the University. The alleged that the Chief Warden misbehaved the research scholars of Nanda Devi hostel and bullied them. After receiving the complaints and before the two more reminders, the ADC organized online meeting and replied to the complainants that the name of the sufferer students and substantial evidences to support the allegation must be provided to ADC, so that ADC could further look into the matter. The complainants did not provide any further information and later on the matter was resolved.

<u>2020-21</u>

A. Events organized:

The University campus was under lockdown due to COVID-19 pandemic due to which all the activities involving gathering of the students were prohibited. Hence, during this period ADC activities were limited to the online mode only, during which ADC members joined the online classes of different departments and told the newly admittd students about the role of ADC in the University campuses.

B. Complaints/ Grievances received to ADC-HNBGU and their redressal:

i. On 21 October, 2020, Mr. Rahul Kumar Vishwakarma (Ph.D. Scholar, Department of chemistry) submitted his complaint to the ADC, mentioning the harassment by his Ph.D. supervisor and requested for the change of his supervisor. After receiving the complaint, ADC decided that neither the student has written any basis of discrimination not any discrimination is evident from his complaint. ADC also doesn't support any such harassment to any of the student. Moreover, request for change of the supervisor doesn't come under the purview of ADC and it is the jurisdiction of BOS of the concerned department. On these two points ADC can't intervene into the matter. Later, on 25 Oct 2020 Mr. Rahul withdrew his complaint by himself.

<u>2021-22</u>

A. Events organized:

The physical classes or the offline mode of classes was not resumed due to COVID-19 imposed restrictions for first semester of the academic year. Campus opened for physical classes after the

first semester so the ADC activities were very limited. During online classes the ADC members told their newly admitted students about the ADC.

During the NSS special camps on 25 March 2022, Dr. Vineet Maurya, created awareness about ADC and its role in the University campus to the NSS volunteers.

B. Complaints/ Grievances received to ADC-HNBGU and their redressal:

Any complaint was not made to ADC by the students or the staff of the university during 2021-22.
