Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna

(25 April 1919 - 17 March 1989)

Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna, born in Devbhumi Uttarakhand, by virtue of his life of an eternal Karma yogi and a statesman, lifted the glory of Garhwal and India up to the supernal heights. He received his early education from Garhwal region and later on shaped his academic and political career from Allahabad University. Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna was a man of commitment and firmly believed in multi-religious, multi-lingual, and multi-ethnic fabric of Indian society. Risen in politics from the lowest strata this patriotic politician eternally detached himself from all petty selfish motives and refused to compromise with fundamentalism and regionalism.

The history of his political life is full of twist and turns but despite the blows of time and fate, he steered the wheel of his life like the ever-flowing Ganges. Hemwati Nandan, 'the son of the mountains' proved true to his name. He never lost his cool even in the odds emerging off and on in his life. He was one of those few politicians in India who advocated corruption free, neat, and clean administration. He held important ministerial positions for long terms in the Union and State Government.

It was his firm conviction that the autonomy of the democratic institutions should be respected and maintained by the executive machinery. He always emphasized upon the autonomy of the Universities. During his tenure as the Chief Minister of Uttar Pradesh he took special care to maintain the dignity of the status of the Vice-Chancellors. The tremendous love and concern which he manifested towards the teaching community is remembered by teachers to this day with gratitude. All of us will always remember him for his efficient administration and strong commitment, he showed for the all-round development of Garhwal University. Adopting the name of Shri Bahuguna ji for the University, and thereby overwhelmingly portraying its distinctive identity, we salute the late Sri Hemwati Nandan Bahuguna, the true son of the soil.

Founded on December 1, 1973, Hemvati Nandan Bahuguna Garhwal University began as Garhwal University – a result of a historic grassroot movement advocating for accessible higher education in the Garhwal region of Uttarakhand. Renamed in 1989 to honour the visionary leader Shri Hemvati Nandan Bahuguna, the University embodies his commitment to inclusive growth and regional empowerment.

Elevated to the status of a Central University in 2009 under the Central Universities Act, HNB Garhwal University has since evolved into a premier institution of higher education in India. Its dedication to academic excellence, regional development, and community engagement is reflected in its diverse academic programmes, robust research agenda, and inclusive outreach initiatives. With a Pan-India character, the University attracts students and scholars from across the country.

Situated in the Himalayan foothills of Uttarakhand, the University serves as a residential and affiliating institution of higher learning. Its jurisdiction spans seven districts of the Garhwal region through its headquarters in Srinagar and three campuses—Birla Campus (Srinagar) — with an extension at Chauras, BGR Campus (Pauri), and SRT Campus (Badshahi Thaul, Tehri). Over 70 affiliated colleges further extend their academic influence across the region.

Accredited with 'A' Grade by NAAC, the University has implemented National Education Policy-2020 since 2022. The 49 Departments of 11 Schools of study in the University campuses offer 14 UG, 59 PG, 02 5-year Integrated, 04 PG Diploma, 04 Diploma and 04 other programmes of studies. Also, Ph.D. programme is available in 48 disciplines. Besides academics, the students can participate in extension activities through NSS, NCC, cultural exchanges, sports and other Government of India sponsored programmes like Ek Bharat Shreshtha Bharat, Viksit Bharat Youth Parliament, Unnat Bharat Abhiyan, Swachhta Hi Seva Hai Abhiyan etc.

In the academic year 2024–25, the number of enrolled students were more than 50,000, including 11,508 across its campuses. It offers a wide spectrum of undergraduate, postgraduate, and doctoral programs across disciplines, along with region-specific courses tailored to the socio-economic and ecological needs of the Himalayas.

The structure and implementation of the programmes under NEP 2020 are governed by the provisions outlined in the *Curriculum and Credit Framework for Undergraduate Programmes*, *Curriculum and Credit Framework for Postgraduate Programmes*, the *National Higher Education Qualification Framework (NHEQF)*, and the *National Credit Framework (NCrF)*.

FOUR-YEAR UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMME (FYUP) [FOR STUDENTS ENROLLED IN 2022, 2023 & 2024]

The Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUP) encompasses Four-Year Bachelor's degree programmes such as B.A., B.Sc., B.Com., B.Tech., B.B.A., B.C.A., and other equivalent undergraduate programmes offered by various departments of the University, in accordance with the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020. Following are the key components of the FYUP:

Descriptions related to the Key Components

(a) Credit

The number of credits assigned to a course reflects the minimum time commitment required by a student in the form of lectures, tutorials, and practical sessions. As per the standard academic structure:

- One credit is equivalent to one hour of classroom teaching per week, or
- Two hours of practical/tutorial work per week.

Each semester shall comprise a minimum of 20 credits. To successfully complete a semester, a student must earn the required credits by passing the prescribed examinations and fulfilling course requirements.

(b) Major Course

The Major discipline represents the principal area of academic specialization within a degree programme. The degree shall be conferred in this discipline. The Major consists of a well-defined set of courses aimed at building comprehensive knowledge and competence in the subject. It includes both Core Courses and Core Elective Courses. To earn a degree with a major, students must meet the minimum credit requirements specified for different program categories.

Core Course/Discipline Specific Core Course (Major): These are mandatory courses associated with the Major discipline that every student must complete. They provide foundational and advanced knowledge essential to the core subject.

Core Elective Course/Discipline Specific Elective Course (Major): These are optional/elective courses within the Major discipline, offered as a pool of subject-specific papers. Students are given the flexibility to select courses based on their academic interests or career goals, allowing for a degree of customization within the Major framework.

(c) Minor Course

A Minor discipline provides students with an opportunity to broaden their knowledge and skills beyond their major discipline. It includes additional courses, vocational courses, and other specialized subjects designed to complement the major. To earn a degree with a minor, students must meet the minimum credit requirements specified for different program categories.

(c.1) Additional courses (Minor):

These courses are offered in addition to the core subject(s) selected by the student at the time of enrollment in the Undergraduate (UG) programme. They aim to broaden the academic exposure and skillset of students beyond their primary discipline. Additional courses offered are of two types: An interdisciplinary (ID) course will be of 4 semesters (semester I-IV) and the multidisciplinary (MD) course will be of two semesters for each subject as selected by the student (semester I-II or semester III-IV).

ID (Minor)—Departments/subjects which provide Additional courses as Interdisciplinary courses will offer the student an opportunity to pursue the same subject as additional course from first to fourth semester. It means student selecting ID subject in first semester will have to pursue the same subject till IV semester of U.G. Program.

MD (Minor)—Subjects which opt for additional course as multidisciplinary courses will offer the student an option to study multidisciplinary course of one subject in one year (I & II semester) and that of other subject in another year (III & IV semester).

Note: Students shall have the option to continue pursuing additional courses (Interdisciplinary or Multidisciplinary) during the VII and VIII semesters of the FYUP.

(c.2) Vocational Course/Field study (Minor):

Vocational courses are designed to equip students with industry-relevant skills through specialized training tailored to the needs of entrepreneurs, businesses, and industries. The objective is to ensure that graduates are employment-ready and possess the practical competencies demanded by the job market. In addition, field study provides students with hands-on experience and practical exposure to real-world settings related to their academic discipline, thereby bridging the gap between theoretical knowledge and professional practice.

(c.3) Other Minor:

Apart from these, the Minor courses may also include a selection of courses from a specific discipline that meet the credit requirements for the minor.

(d) Skill Enhancement Course (SEC)

Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) are specifically designed to strengthen students' practical and applied skillsets, with the objective of enhancing employability and fostering subject-specific competencies. Under the Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUP), students are offered two distinct categories of SEC:

(d.i) Core-Specific Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC):

These courses are directly aligned with the core discipline(s) chosen by the student under the FYUP. Core-specific SECs are offered during Semesters 1 to 4 of the undergraduate programme. In cases where a student has opted for two core disciplines, SECs will be distributed across the first two academic years - one discipline in the first year and the other in the second year.

Example: If a student has selected Botany and Zoology as core disciplines, they will study SECs related to Botany in the first year and SECs related to Zoology in the second year.

(d.ii) Additional Multidisciplinary Skill Courses (AMSC):

These courses provide students with the opportunity to acquire skills beyond their core disciplines, promoting a **multidisciplinary learning experience**. The University will offer a curated set of AMSCs to enable students to explore and develop competencies in diverse fields, thereby broadening their academic and professional horizons.

(e) Value Addition Course (VAC)

These are the courses which are apart from any discipline related courses and aims to add value to the overall personality and development of an individual while focusing on areas such as connecting to environment and community, understanding and connecting with environment; Indian Knowledge System; Culture, traditional and moral values, etc. It is compulsory to study all these value-added courses as offered by the University in different semesters.

(f) Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC)

These courses aim to enhance the different capabilities and abilities of the students which will help them grow in very field of life and will help in their holistic development. Indian, Modern Language, Communication skills and AMSC are the courses offered under the AEC.

Language courses: Under the Indian and Modern Languages, the language courses are offered. The language courses are meant to help the student to learn new languages of his/her choices. Student will be provided a pool of languages from which student may opt to study one language in any one semester and the other language in another semester for 2 credits each (5th or 6th semester).

(g) Self and Social Development Course

University will offer two courses under SSD that are **(1) Community Connect & Service (2) Extracurricular activities**. Student will have the choice to complete anyone of the two coursework. The course objective is to promote student participation in Community service/extracurricular activities for their self-development along with increasing their participation and developing within them a responsibility towards self and social development.

(g.i) Community Connect & Service Coursework: This course is aimed to connect students with community with the objective of understanding their issues and delivering their valuable inputs for the welfare of society. Student will have to deliver service equivalent to 2 credits for completing the course. This mandatory service may be completed in any one or two semesters from I to VIII semester (I to VI semester in case of exit with

Three years UG degree) or I to VIII semester in case of completion/exit with Four-Year UG Honours/ Honours with research) through any social activity organized under the banner of “Swachh Bharat”, “Ek Bharat Shrestha Bharat”, “NSS”, “NCC”, “Namami Gange” or social activities organised by the Campus or Departments. Student will have to produce a certificate in this regard from the organizers of the event(s).

(g.ii) Extracurricular Activities Coursework: This course work required student participation in university demarcated activities such as Participation/representation of institution in **Intercollegiate level activities/State level activities/National level activities (Sports/Cultural etc.)**.

(h) Short Term Skill course (STSC)

The university will also offer **Short Term Skill Course (STSC)**, which will be open to the local community, dropouts, college education candidates not having college education and other aspirants who can do them fulfilling minimum eligibility required for the course for admitting in the course. These courses will be of short duration for target groups and will not be for students undergoing four-year U.G. program.

Multiple Entry and Multiple Exit under FYUP

In accordance with the Multiple Entry and Exit provisions outlined in the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, students will be offered flexible exit and re-entry options aligned with the corresponding National Higher Education Qualification Framework (NHEQF) levels and their respective academic requirements.

First Year (Under Graduate Certificate -NHEQF level-4.5)

- ❖ Under Graduate Certificate for those who exit the FYUP after successfully completing 1 year (2 semesters-I & II) by securing minimum 40 credits. *In case of B.Tech./B.E. programme the exit requirements are minimum 52 credits* for an exit after 1year of FYUP.
- ❖ Further, in addition, they have to complete one Skill enhancement/vocational course of 4 credits during the summer vacation following the first year.

Second Year (Under Graduate Diploma-NHEQF Level-5)

- ❖ Under Graduate Diploma for those who exit the FYUP after successfully completing I & II year (4 semesters-I, II, III, IV) of the FYUP, i.e., securing minimum 80 credits. *In case of B.Tech./B.E. programme the exit requirements are minimum 104 credits* for an exit after 2 years of FYUP.
- ❖ Further in addition, they have to complete one Skill enhancement/vocational course of 4 credits during the summer vacation following the second year.

Third Year (Bachelor’s Degree- NHEQF Level- 5.5)

- ❖ Bachelor’s degree for those who exit the FYUP after successfully completing I, II & III years (6 semesters- I, II, III, IV, V, VI) of the FYUP i.e., securing minimum 120 credits. *In case of B.Tech./B.E. programme the exit requirements are minimum 156 credits* for an exit after 3 years of FYUP.
- ❖ Further, they have to secure additional 2 credits under Self and social Development course work (SSD).

Fourth Year (Bachelor’s Degree (Honours/ Honours with Research)- NHEQF Level- 6)

In case of UG Multidisciplinary Programmes

- ❖ Bachelor’s degree (Honours/ Honours with Research): After successfully completing I, II, III & IV year (I, II, III, IV, V, VI, VII & VIII semester) of the FYUP, i.e., securing minimum 160/176 credits along with additional 2 credits under Self and Social Development course work (SSD).

In case of UG programmes with Single Major

Bachelor’s degree (Honours/ Honours with Research)- After successfully completing I, II & III & IV years-8 semesters (I, II, III, IV, V, VI, VII, VIII) of the FYUP, i.e., securing minimum 160 credits along with additional 2 credits under Self and Social Development course work (SSD).

Bachelor’s Degree with Honours (4-Year Programme)

Upon successful completion of the three-year Bachelor’s degree requirements, students may opt to continue into the fourth year of the Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUP) to pursue a Bachelor’s Degree with Honours.

This programme is intended for students who wish to major in one subject while selecting another as a minor, and who aspire to gain a deeper understanding of their chosen discipline. The Honours degree spans a total of eight semesters and offers an advanced and in-depth curriculum in the major subject area.

Bachelor's Degree with Honours with Research (4-Year Programme):

Students who complete the three-year Bachelor's degree and attain a minimum Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) of 7.5 are eligible to enroll in the fourth year to pursue a Bachelor's Degree with Honours with Research.

This programme is specifically designed for students with a strong interest in academic research. The programme places an enhanced focus on research-oriented studies alongside core disciplinary learning. Students will undertake a significant research project or dissertation in their major field during the final year, equipping them with foundational skills for postgraduate research.

Note: In case of B.Tech./B.E. programme, Bachelor's Degree will be awarded only after completion of Four year of U.G. Programme.

Procedure for Applying for Exit from FYUP

The student after attaining minimum 44 credits/minimum 84 credits/minimum 120+2 credits (SSD credits) or *in case of B.Tech./B.E. programme minimum 52 credits/ minimum 104 credits/minimum 156+2 credits (SSD)* may in writing request for an exit after 1 year/ 2 years/ 3 years of FYUP to HoD/ Dean of their respective schools. The same request has to be further submitted to the Controller of Examinations for further necessary action.

Categories of Students Eligible for Entry and Re-entry under the Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUP)

Entry and Re-entry options in the FYUP will be for the following categories of students:

First Category: those who were earlier pursuing FYUP from HNB Garhwal University (HNBGU) and exited the program in between and have re-entered without further advancement in the same programme in HNBGU.

Example: A student exited the FYUP (B.Sc.) after successfully completing first year (B.Sc. I Year - 1st & 2nd semester) from HNBGU and requested for re-entry after two years in second year (B.Sc. II Year - 3rd semester) of the same FYUP program in HNBGU.

Second Category: those who were earlier pursuing FYUP from HNB Garhwal University and exited the program in between and have re-entered with further advancement in the same program. **Example:** A student exited the FYUP after completing first year (B.A. I Year - 1st and 2nd semester) from HNBGU, pursued Second year (B.A. II Year - 3rd and 4th semester) in other University (XYZ University) and requested for reentry after one or more years in third year of the same FYUP program in HNBGU.

Third Category: those students who were pursuing FYUP from other Universities (other than HNBGU) and have requested for entry in second, third or fourth year of FYUP of HNBGU.

Entry and Re-entry Criteria for Different Categories of Students

1. The maximum duration to qualify any FYUP will be **7 (seven) years** in HNBGU, including the time spent in other Universities under same FYUP.
2. In case of first category students the re-entry will be directly provided to the students.
3. In case of second category of students, the University School level committee headed by Dean of the School(s) will scrutinize the courses pursued by the student in other Universities and will match them with the courses offered by HNBGU under the same NHEQF level. If the courses match to 70% or more in the admissible subject combination (Core Course) taken together, the student will be allowed to re-enter the FYUP in HNBGU. The re-entry will be provided subject to the availability/vacancy of the seats under the different categories.

4. If the courses do not match to 70% or more in the admissible subject combination (Core Course) taken together, the student will not be allowed to re-enter in the FYUP in HNBGU.
5. In case of third category of students, the University School level committee headed by Dean of the school(s) will scrutinize the courses pursued by the student in other Universities and will match them with the courses offered by HNBGU under the same NHEQF levels. If the courses match to 70% or more in the admissible subject combination (Core Course) taken together, the student will be allowed to enter in the FYUP in HNBGU. The entry will be provided subject to the availability/vacancy of the seats under the different categories.
6. If the courses do not match to 70% or more in the admissible subject combination (Core Course) taken together, the student will not be allowed to re-enter in the FYUP in HNBGU.

Procedure for Applying for Entry in FYUP

The student after attaining the required credits applying for entry/re-entry may have to give in writing an application to Registrar, HNB Garhwal University along with the following documents:

1. Marksheet/Course Certificate/Diploma etc. of last session of FYUP completed.

The same request will then be forwarded to the related Dean of the School(s) for further necessary action.

The University holds the right to modify and upgrade the entry and exit procedure and other requirements, which will be duly uploaded on the University Website.

Learning Mode: Following will be the learning mode in the UG Programme:

- All courses may be conducted in blended mode, i.e., 80% offline and 20% online in Bachelor's Degree Programmes.
- Courses will be taught through Lectures, Tutorials and Practical/ Field-based studies.
- Departments may offer SWAYAM/ MOOCs courses, provided the credits from such courses should not exceed the 40% of the total credits under a program.
- Students may opt for MOOC course to earn required or extra credits.

Departments offering ID and MD Courses

Following Department are offering (ID) Interdisciplinary course as an Additional subject*:

- (1) Biochemistry, Biotechnology, Botany, Microbiology, and Zoology
- (2) Chemistry, Mathematics, Physics, and Statistics
- (3) Geology
- (4) Anthropology, Defense Studies, and Home Science

Note: In case of selecting I.D. course under an additional subject the student will have to study the same subject as an additional course for first 4 semesters of U.G. Program. **Example:** If a student with 'Botany' and 'Zoology' as Core subjects selects 'Chemistry' as an additional subject then she/he will have to study 'Chemistry' as an additional subject in first 4 semesters (I, II, III, IV semester).

Following Schools/ Departments are offering (MD) multidisciplinary Course as an Additional subject*.

- (1) School of Humanities and Social Sciences
- (2) School of Arts, Communication and Languages
- (3) School of Commerce
- (4) School of Engineering and Technology
- (5) Department of Defense Studies, Home Science, Physical Education, and Yogic Science

Note: In case of selecting MD course under an additional subject the student will have to study one subject as an additional course in first year (I & II semesters) of U.G. Program and another subject as an additional course in another year (III & IV semesters). **Example:** If a student with 'Economics' and 'Sociology' as Core subjects

selects 'History' as an additional (MD) subject for first year then she/he will have to study 'History' as an additional subject in first year (I, II semesters) and if, she/he selects 'Political Science' as an additional subject (MD) for another year then she/he will study 'Political Science' in second year (III & IV semester) as an additional multidisciplinary subject.

***This offering is not mandatory and may be interchange depending on the specific requirement of the subject**

Seat Allotment/ Intake in Additional Subject (ID or MD):

The intake of seats for core courses will be as mentioned in the university prospectus. Seats under Subjects offering ID course will be as follows:

- (1) **Seats under Subjects offering ID Course:** Under the ID (additional course) the number of seats will be Maximum 40 percent of the total seats (Seats allocated under the admission for core subject) allocated for the Subject. However, in case, the seats/intake in any UG Programme is more than 500 in Core Courses, then 40% Additional ID seats will be considered as included in Core seats. Only in case of chemistry, Maximum 50 percent of the total seats (Seats allocated under the admission for core subject) will comprise of additional ID seats for Chemistry.
- (2) **Seats under Subjects offering MD Course:** The total number of seats for a department for M.D course shall not exceed maximum 50 percent of the total seats (Seats allocated under the admission for core subject) allocated for the subject.

Note: The ID and MD Seats are over and above the core seats and cannot be adjusted with the core seats.

The University will have the right to change/modify the Programme/course structure or other information mentioned in admission prospectus as per UGC guidelines or NEP suggested framework in future.

Note*: The above Multidisciplinary Programmes also contains common courses (VAC and AEC)

Four-Year Bachelor's Degree

A four-year Bachelor's degree with Honours shall be awarded upon the successful completion of 176 academic credits, along with 2 credits in **Self-Study and Development (SSD)**, in either of the two aforementioned multidisciplinary programmes. Students will have the flexibility to choose any two subjects within their core disciplines under the selected programme. A minimum of 88 credits must be earned in the subjects belonging to the student's core discipline.

Major and Minor (Four-Year Bachelor's Degree with Honours)

A student enrolled in a four-year undergraduate programme with two core subjects/disciplines shall be awarded a Bachelor's degree with Honours and a Major in a particular subject/discipline upon successful completion of the eighth semester, provided the student has earned a minimum of 88 credits in that subject out of the total 176 credits. These 88 credits must be accumulated through Discipline Specific Core/Core Courses (DSC/CC), Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) related to the core subject, Discipline Specific Electives (DSE) and Academic project related to the Major Subject.

Example: A student pursuing a B.A. (Honours) programme with Political Science and History as core subjects shall be awarded a Major in History if she/he earns at least 88 credits from DSC/CC, SEC (History-related), DSE courses and completes Academic project in History by the end of the eighth semester.

Additionally, the student shall be awarded a Minor in Political Science if she/he earns a minimum of 24 credits

from DSC/CC, SEC (Political Science-related), and DSE courses in Political Science. A student may also be eligible for a Minor(s) in a Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary (MD/ID) subject or discipline if she/he completes at least 24 credits in the discipline(s) by the end of the eighth semester.

Major and Minor (Four-Year Bachelor's Degree–Honours with Research)

A student enrolled in a four-year undergraduate programme with two core subjects/disciplines shall be awarded an Honours with Research degree with a Major in one subject upon successful completion of the eighth semester, provided they earn a minimum of 88 credits in that subject out of the total 176 credits. These 88 credits must be accumulated through Discipline Specific Core/Core Courses (DSC/CC), Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) related to the core subject, Discipline Specific Electives (DSE) and writes dissertation on the chosen major discipline.

Example: A student pursuing a B.Sc. (Honours with Research) in Physics and Chemistry as core subjects will be awarded a Major in Physics if she/he successfully completes at least 88 credits through DSC/CC, SEC (Physics-related), DSE courses, and writes dissertation on the Physics.

Such a student shall also be awarded a Minor in Chemistry if she/he earns a minimum of 24 credits through DSC/CC, SEC (Chemistry-related), and DSE courses in Chemistry.

A student may also be eligible for a Minor(s) in a Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary (MD/ID) subject or discipline if they complete at least 24 credits in the discipline(s) by the end of the eighth semester.

Note: The Departments offering a 4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research) must have the required infrastructure such as the library, access to journals, computer lab and software, laboratory facilities to carry out experimental research work, and at least two permanent faculty members who are recognized as Ph.D. supervisors. The Departments already recognized for conducting the Ph.D. programme may conduct a 4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research) without obtaining any approval from the affiliating University.

Three-Year Bachelor's Degree (Multidisciplinary Programme) (In case of Exit)

Three-Year Bachelor's Degree (Exit Option after VI Semester)

A student who chooses to exit the programme after successfully completing the sixth semester shall be awarded a Three-year Bachelor's Degree, provided they have earned a total of 120 academic credits, including 2 credits in Self-Study and Development (SSD), from any of the aforementioned multidisciplinary programmes.

A student enrolled in a Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUP) with two Core subjects will be eligible for a Three-year Bachelor's Degree upon successful completion of six semesters, in the event of exiting the FYUP. If the student earns a minimum of 80 credits from the two core subjects in the Arts or Science disciplines out of the total 120 credits, she/he will be awarded a Three-Year Bachelor's Degree in Arts or Science discipline, respectively. These 80 credits of core courses must be earned through Discipline-Specific Core/Core Courses (DSC/CC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) related to the two chosen subjects.

Example: If a student exits the Four-year Bachelor's Degree programme in science after three years with Zoology and Botany as Core subjects and has secured 80 credits from DSC/CC and SEC courses in these core Science disciplines, they will be awarded a Three-Year Bachelor's Degree in Science.

5. Four-Year Bachelor’s Degree (B.Tech.) in Computer Science & Engineering/Information Technology/ Electronics & Communication Engineering/Instrumentation Engineering/Mechanical Engineering

Note: All the above programmes also contain common courses (VAC and AEC)

Four-Year Bachelor's Degree Programme

A four-year Bachelor's degree (with Honours) in the aforementioned programmes shall be awarded upon successful completion of **160 academic credits**, along with **2 additional credits in Self-Study and Development (SSD)**.

Major/Minor Four-Year Bachelor's Degree (Honours)

A student enrolled in a four-year undergraduate programme with a single core subject/discipline shall be awarded a Bachelor's degree with Honours and a Major in that subject upon successful completion of the eighth semester, provided they earn a minimum of 100 credits in the core subject out of the total 160 credits. These 100 credits must be accumulated through Discipline Specific Core/Core Courses (DSC/CC), Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) related to the core discipline, and Discipline Specific Electives (DSE).

Example: A student pursuing a B.Com. (Honours) programme with Commerce as the core subject will be awarded a Major in Commerce if they earn at least 100 credits in Commerce through DSC/CC, SEC, and DSE courses by the end of the eighth semester.

Additionally, such a student may be awarded a Minor in another discipline (e.g., Business Economics) if they earn a minimum of 24 credits in a Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary (MD/ID) subject or discipline, including credits earned through vocational courses offered in the fifth and sixth semesters.

Major/Minor under Four-Year Bachelor's Degree (Honours with Research)

A four-year Bachelor's degree (Honours with Research) in the aforementioned programmes shall be awarded upon successful completion of 160 academic credits, along with 2 credits in Self-Study and Development (SSD).

A student enrolled in a four-year undergraduate programme with a single core subject/discipline shall be awarded a Bachelor's degree with Honours and Research with a Major in that subject upon successful completion of the eighth semester, provided they earn a minimum of 100 credits in the core discipline out of the total 160 credits. These credits must be earned through: Discipline Specific Core/Core Courses (DSC/CC); Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) related to the core discipline; Discipline Specific Electives (DSE) and a Dissertation worth 12 credits, aligned with the core subject.

Example: a student pursuing a B.Com. (Honours with Research) with Commerce as the core subject shall be awarded a Major in Commerce if they complete at least 100 credits through DSC/CC, SEC, and DSE courses in Commerce, and successfully submit a dissertation related to Commerce.

In addition, such a student may be awarded a Minor in another discipline (e.g., Business Economics) if they earn a minimum of 24 credits in a Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary (MD/ID) subject or discipline. This may include credits earned through Vocational Courses offered during the fifth and sixth semesters. Research Methodology and Research Writing and Ethics offered in seventh semester will be designated as Minor courses in case of such programmes under FYUP.

Note: The Departments offering a 4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research) must have the required infrastructure such as the library, access to journals, computer lab and software, laboratory facilities to carry out experimental research work, and at least two permanent faculty members who are recognized as Ph.D. supervisors. The Departments already recognized for conducting the Ph.D. programme may conduct a 4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research) without obtaining any approval from the affiliating University.

Three-Years Undergraduate Programme with Single Major (In Case of Exit)

Major and Minor under Three-Year Bachelor's Degree (Exit Option after VI Semester): A student who chooses to exit the programme after the successful completion of the sixth semester shall be awarded a Three-year Bachelor's Degree, provided they have earned a minimum of 120 academic credits, including 2 credits in Self-Study and Development (SSD), in any of the two aforementioned programmes.

A student pursuing a three-year undergraduate programme with a single core subject/discipline shall be awarded a Bachelor's Degree in that discipline, upon exit after the sixth semester. To be awarded a Major, the student must have earned at least 80 credits out of the total 120 credits from the core subject. These credits must be accumulated through Discipline Specific Core/Core Courses (DSC/CC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) related to the core discipline.

Example: A student enrolled in a three-year B.Com. Programme with Commerce as the core subject will be awarded a B.Com. Degree with a Major in Commerce if they earn a minimum of 80 credits from DSC/CC and SEC courses in Commerce.

Additionally, the student may be awarded a Minor in another discipline (e.g., Business Economics) if they earn at least 24 credits in a Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary (MD/ID) subject or discipline, which may include credits from vocational courses offered during the fifth and sixth semesters.

Four–Year Bachelor’s Degree (B.Tech.)

A **Four-Year Bachelor’s degree (B.Tech.)** in the aforementioned programmes will be awarded upon successful completion of **200 academic credits**, along with an additional **2 credits in Self-Study and Development (SSD)**.

Note: The distribution of credits for the **B.Tech.** programme is outlined in the course structure.

Major and Minor (Four Year Bachelor’s Degree)

A student pursuing a four-year undergraduate programme with a single core subject/discipline shall be awarded a Bachelor’s degree with Honours and a Major in that subject upon successful completion of the eighth semester, provided she/he earns a minimum of 130 credits in the core subject out of the total 200 credits. These 130 credits must be earned through coursework in Discipline Specific Core/Core Courses (DSC/CC), Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) related to the core discipline, and Discipline Specific Electives (DSE).

Example: A student pursuing a B.Tech. (Honours) with Mechanical Engineering as the core subject will be awarded a Major in Mechanical Engineering upon successful completion of the eighth semester, provided she/he earns at least 130 credits from DSC/CC, SEC, and DSE courses in Mechanical Engineering.

Additionally, such a student may be awarded a Minor in another discipline (e.g., Computer Science) if she/he earns a minimum of 40 credits from Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary (MD/ID)/Minor courses in Computer Science, after completing the eighth semester.

Three–Year Undergraduate Degree (B.Voc.)–Bachelor of Vocation (In case of exit)

Major and Minor Under Three–Year Undergraduate Degree (B.Voc.)–Bachelor of Vocation (In case of exit)

A student who exits the programme after the successful completion of the sixth semester shall be awarded a Three-Year Bachelor’s Degree (B.Voc), provided she/he have earned a total of 156 academic credits, including 2 credits in Self-Study and Development (SSD), in any of the two offered programmes.

A student exiting with a three-year undergraduate degree programme with one core subject/discipline will be awarded a Bachelor’s Degree (B.Voc.) in that discipline upon exit after the sixth semester. To be awarded a Major in the subject/discipline, the student must earn a minimum of 98 credits out of the total 156 credits from the core subject. These 98 credits must be earned through the following courses: Discipline Specific Core/Core Courses (DSC/CC); Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) related to the core discipline.

Example: A student exiting with a three-year B.Voc. programme with Information Technology as the core subject will be awarded a B.Voc. Degree with a Major in Information Technology, provided she/he earns minimum 98 credits from DSC/CC and SEC courses in Information Technology.

Additionally, such a student may be awarded a Minor in another discipline (e.g., Instrumentation Engineering) if she/he earns a minimum of 40 credits from Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary (MD/ID)/Minor courses related to Instrumentation Engineering, after completing the sixth semester.

III. DUAL MAJOR-INTEGRATED DEGREE PROGRAMME

Following Dual Major Integrated Programme under NEP 2020 is offered under FYUP in the University from academic session 2023-24.

- Four Years Dual Degree Integrated Teacher Education Programme (ITEP): B.Sc. B.Ed. (Secondary); B.A. B.Ed. (Secondary); B.Com. B.Ed. (Secondary)

The ITEP is of four years duration across eight semesters of study. It is a dual-major bachelor's degree programme with one major in Education and the other in a disciplinary (B.A., B.Sc. or B.Com.) branch of knowledge.

The ITEP envisages multiple entry and exit points and re-entry options, with appropriate certifications. Student-teachers who wish to exit after completion of one year (two semesters) of study will be given a Certificate in their major (discipline) indicating the credits accrued for the courses pursued. Student-teachers who wish to exit after completion of two years (four semesters) will be given a Diploma in their major (discipline), indicating the credits accrued for the courses completed. Student-teachers who wish to exit after successful completion of three years (six semesters) will be awarded a Bachelor's Degree in the chosen Major area of study upon securing a minimum of 120 credits and satisfying the minimum credit requirements of 48 credits for the Major. Student-teachers who successfully complete four years (eight semesters) of study will be awarded a dual-major bachelor's degree, B.A. B.Ed. or B.Sc. B.Ed. or B.Com. B.Ed. upon securing a minimum of 160 credits, (maximum 176) including a minimum of 80 credits for the first major (i.e. in education), and a minimum of 48 credits for the second major in a disciplinary area relating to one of the curricular areas in school education (Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Zoology and Botany for B.Sc.; History, Political Science, Geography, Economics, Drawing and Painting for B.A.; and Business studies for B.Com.).

FOUR-YEAR UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMME (FYUP) [w.e.f. ACADEMIC SESSION 2025-26*]

(*The Programmes with Single Major (B.Tech.) offered by School of Engineering & Technology under FYUP will be as per the course structure of Academic Session 2024-25)

The following course descriptions, course structure, and other relevant information will apply exclusively to students enrolling in undergraduate programmes for the first time in the Academic Session 2025–26:

Descriptions related to the Contents

(a) Credit

The number of credits assigned to a course reflects the minimum time commitment required by a student in the form of lectures, tutorials, and practical sessions. As per the standard academic structure:

- One credit is equivalent to one hour of classroom teaching per week, or
- Two hours of practical/tutorial work per week.

Each semester shall comprise a minimum of 20 credits. To successfully complete a semester, a student must earn the required credits by passing the prescribed examinations and fulfilling course requirements.

Selection of Major and Minor Subjects (FYUP in Arts/Science)

(b) Major Course

In the **first semester**, students are required to select one Major and one Minor subject, preferably from the same broad subject group. However, in cases where this is not feasible—either due to the student's preference or institutional constraints—students may opt their Minor subject from a different group. This flexibility shall be exercised within the framework of broad subject groups as defined by the University.

From the **second semester** onward, students will continue with three subjects: one Major, one Minor, and one Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary (MD/ID) subject. A limited number of students may be allowed to change their Major and Minor subjects after the completion of the second semester, subject to their academic performance in the first semester and approval from the university authorities.

Major: The Major discipline represents the principal area of academic specialization within a degree programme. The degree shall be conferred in this discipline. The student must attain a minimum of 50% of total credits in a discipline to earn an undergraduate degree with a major in that discipline. The Major consists of a well-defined set of courses aimed at building comprehensive knowledge and competence in the subject. It includes both **Discipline Specific Core (DSC) Courses**, **Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) Courses** and **Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC)** related to the core subject. To earn a degree with a major, students must meet the minimum credit requirements specified for different program categories.

Selection of Major and Minor Subject (FYUP in Commerce/Business Administration/Yogic Science/Journalism and Mass Communication)

In the first semester, students are advised to select one Major and two Minor Interdisciplinary subjects, preferably from the same broad subject group. However, if a student so desires, or if the department/institution is unable to offer all selected subjects within the same group, the student may opt for one subject from a different group. This flexibility shall remain within the limits of the broad subject groups as defined by the University. From the second semester onward, students will continue with three subjects: one Major, one Minor, and one Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary (MD/ID) subject.

Level of Courses offered under Major Category in different years of FYUP

Major courses in the first two semesters (I & II) will be Introductory level courses, in the next two semesters of FYUP i.e. (III & IV Semesters) they will be of Intermediate-level. Further in the third year of FYUP i.e. (V & VI semesters) they will be Higher level courses. In the fourth year of FYUP i.e., (VII & VIII semesters) the

Major courses offered will be higher level courses or Advanced level courses or a combination of both level of courses. Following are the different categories of Major courses to be offered under FYUP:

Core Course/Discipline Specific Core Course (Major): These are mandatory courses associated with the Major discipline that every student must complete. They provide foundational and advanced knowledge essential to the core subject.

Core Elective Course/Discipline Specific Elective Course (Major): These are optional/elective courses within the Major discipline, offered as a pool of subject-specific papers. Students are given the flexibility to select courses based on their academic interests or career goals, allowing for a degree of customization within the Major framework.

Core-Specific Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC): These courses are directly aligned with the core discipline(s) chosen by the student under the FYUP. Core-specific. The skill courses aim to enhance the skills of the students based on the core courses opted by them under the FYUP. These are specialized skill-based courses aligned with the core subjects offered by the departments. Additional skill-oriented courses will also be provided under various categories. Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) are further available as part of the Minor Course offerings.

SEC are also offered as AMSC (Additional Multidisciplinary Skill Courses) in Second Year of FYUP.

Vocational Course/Field Visit/Internship: Vocational courses are designed to equip students with industry-relevant skills through specialized training tailored to the needs of entrepreneurs, businesses, and industries. The objective is to ensure that graduates are employment-ready and possess the practical competencies demanded by the job market. Internships further enhance this by offering students the opportunity to work in professional environments where they can apply their classroom learning, develop workplace skills, build industry connections, and gain insights into career pathways. In addition to providing students with practical, experience-based learning, fieldwork/field visit aims to expose them to real-world socio-economic and societal challenges, allowing them to bridge the gap between theory and practice and develop effective solutions to real-life problems.

Project Report: The Project Report course under NEP 2020 aims to cultivate research aptitude, analytical thinking, and academic writing skills among students. It provides hands-on experience in identifying problems, collecting data, and presenting findings systematically. This experiential learning component enhances subject-specific understanding, promotes interdisciplinary approaches, and prepares students for research-based higher education or professional roles in diverse fields.

(c) Minor Course

A Minor discipline provides students with an opportunity to broaden their knowledge and skills beyond their major discipline. The Minor courses include Discipline specific courses, skill courses, community outreach-based courses and multi-disciplinary/inter-disciplinary (MD/ID) courses in the FYUP. A minimum of 32 credits will be offered under Minor Courses in a four-year undergraduate programme, while a minimum of 24 credits will be offered in a three-year undergraduate programme. Students must earn these credits through approved Minor Courses. However, to obtain a degree with a Minor in a particular subject/discipline, students must also fulfil the minimum credit requirements specified for their respective programme categories.

(c.1) Discipline Specific Minor: The Discipline Specific Minor courses include a selection of courses from a specific discipline, opted by a student, that meet the credit requirements for the minor. Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) will also be offered under the minor courses.

Community Outreach: The curricular component of 'Community Outreach' will involve activities that would expose students to the socio-economic issues in society so that the theoretical learnings can be supplemented by actual life experiences to generate solutions to real-life problems.

Level of Courses offered under Discipline Specific Minor Category in different years of FYUP

Discipline Specific Minor courses in the first two semesters (I & II) will be Introductory level courses, in the next two semesters (III & IV Semesters) they will be of Intermediate-level. Further if offered/opted in the third year (V & VI semesters) they will be Higher level courses. In the fourth year, the Discipline Specific Minor courses offered will be Higher level courses or advanced level courses or a combination of both level of courses.

(c.2) Additional Courses-ID/ MD Courses (Minor): In addition to discipline-specific minors, students enrolled in Undergraduate (UG) programmes will also have the opportunity to pursue additional minor courses, categorized as Interdisciplinary (ID) or Multidisciplinary (MD) courses.

In case of ID/MD courses, the students are not allowed to choose or repeat courses already undergone at the higher secondary level (12th class or equivalent grade level).

These Courses are offered alongside the core subject(s) selected at the time of enrolment and are designed to broaden students' academic exposure and enhance their skillsets beyond their primary discipline. These additional courses will be available during the first four semesters (Semesters I–IV), with an option to pursue them at a higher or an advanced level in the seventh and eighth semesters of the Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUP).

Selection criteria for MD and ID (FYUP in Arts/Science)

Students seeking admission will have to opt two (02) interdisciplinary/ multidisciplinary (MD/ID) subjects in the first year. In the second year the student will continue with one MD/ID only.

Selection criteria for MD and ID (FYUP in Commerce/Business Administration/Yogic Science/Journalism and Mass Communication)

Students seeking admission will have to select one subject under MD/ID category.

The student shall have the option to select the Interdisciplinary (ID) subject—previously not continued as a Minor—for continuation under the MD/ID category in the second year and fourth year.

Students seeking admission, opting for two core papers from two different subjects/disciplines, must select their MD/ID subject from a subject/discipline other than those two core subjects/discipline chosen at the time of admission and one that was not studied at the 12th Class or equivalent grade level.

Departments offering additional courses as Interdisciplinary (ID) or Multidisciplinary (MD) options shall provide student the opportunity to pursue the same subject as an additional course from the first to the fourth semester. This means that a student who selects an ID/MD subject in the first semester will be required to continue with the same subject through the fourth semester of the undergraduate programme, with the option to pursue it again in the **seventh and eighth semesters**.

Level of Courses offered under Additional Courses-ID/MD Courses (Minor) Category in different years of FYUP

In the first two semesters (I & II) of the FYUP, Interdisciplinary/Multidisciplinary (ID/MD) courses will be offered at the introductory level and may include skill enhancement components. In the following two semesters (III & IV), these courses will be of intermediate or higher level and may involve skill enhancement related to the ID/MD subject. If a student opts to pursue these courses as part of a Minor in the fourth year of the FYUP (i.e., in the VII and VIII semesters), they will be offered at a higher or advanced level, or as a combination of both.

Note:

1. Students shall have the option to continue pursuing the same additional course (Interdisciplinary or Multidisciplinary) as minor course in the VII and VIII semesters of the FYUP.
2. In the case of the B.Tech. programme, only the Minor chosen during the first three years will be continued into the fourth year of the programme.

Departments offering ID and MD Courses

Following Schools/ Departments are offering Interdisciplinary (ID)/ Multidisciplinary (MD) Courses as an Additional subject:

Chemistry, Home Science, Mathematics, Physics, Statistics (**School of Sciences**); Commerce (**School of Commerce**); Geology, Geography, Defence, Strategic and Geopolitical Studies (**School of Earth Science**); ITEP, Education [Affiliated college] (**School of Education**); Computer Science (**School of Engineering & Technology**); Centre of Journalism & Mass Communication, Drawing & Painting, English, Hindi, Music, Sanskrit, Yogic Science (**School of Arts, Communication and Languages**); Anthropology, Economics, History, Philosophy, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology (**School of Humanities and Social Sciences**); Botany & Microbiology, Biotechnology, Biochemistry, Environmental Sciences, Zoology (**School of Life Sciences**); Business Management (**School of Management**).

Value Addition Course (VAC)

These are the courses which are apart from any discipline related courses and aims to add value to the overall personality and development of an individual while focusing on areas such as Connecting to Environment and Community, Understanding and Connecting with Environment; Culture, Traditions and Moral Values, etc. It is compulsory to study all these Value-Added Courses as offered by the University in different semesters.

(d) Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC)

These courses aim to enhance the different capabilities and abilities of the students which will help them grow in very field of life and will help in their holistic development. Indian, Modern Language, Indian Knowledge System and Communication Skills are the courses offered under the AEC. Some of the courses offered under the AEC category are designed to strengthen students' skill sets and may also be classified as Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC), depending on their content and learning outcomes. Communication Skills, Indian Knowledge System and other such courses enhancing the different skillsets of the students will also be categorised under Skill Enhancement Courses.

Language Courses: Under the Indian and Modern Languages Course category, students are offered language courses designed to help them learn new languages of their choice. A pool of languages will be made available, from which students may choose to study one language in each semester and another in a subsequent semester, each carrying 2 credits.

Seat Allotment/ Intake in Additional Subject (ID or MD)

The intake of seats for core courses will be as mentioned in the university Admission Prospectus. Seats under Subjects offering ID course will be as follows:

(i) Seats under Subjects offering ID course

Under the ID (additional course) the number of seats will be Maximum 40 percent of the total seats allocated for the Core Subject/department. Only in case of Chemistry, Maximum 50 percent of the total seats allocated for Core subject will comprise of additional ID seats for Chemistry. However, in case, the seats/intake in any UG Programme is more than 500 in Core Courses, then 40% Additional ID seats will be considered as included in Core seats.

(ii) Seats under Subjects offering MD Course

The total number of seats for a department for MD course shall not exceed maximum 50 percent of the total seats allocated for Core subject/department.

Note:

1. The ID and MD seats are over and above the Core seats and cannot be adjusted with the core seats.
2. In case of ID/MD courses, the students are not allowed to choose or repeat courses already undergone at the higher secondary level (12th class or equivalent grade level).

3. The University reserves the right to revise the programme/course structure or seat allotment in accordance with UGC guidelines or the framework suggested under the NEP and University requirements.

Programmes offered under FYUP

I. Programme with Single Major in Arts and Science

Following two Bachelor's degree Programmes with single Major in Arts and Science are offered under FYUP in the University with a total of 176 credits:

1. Four Year Bachelor's Degree in Arts (Honours/ Honours with Research) with Major Subject
2. Four Year Bachelor's Degree in Science (Honours/ Honours with Research) with Major Subject

II. Other Programmes with Single Major

Following Programmes are offered under FYUP in the University with single Major with a total of 176 credits:

1. Four Year Bachelor's Degree in Commerce (Honours/ Honours with Research)
2. Four Year Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration (Honours/ Honours with Research)
3. Four Year Bachelor's Degree in Yogic Sciences (Honours/ Honours with Research)
4. Four Year Bachelor's Degree in Journalism and Mass Communication (Honours/ Honours with Research)

III. Dual Major-Integrated Degree Programme

Following Dual Major Integrated Programme under NEP 2020 is offered under FYUP in the University: Four Years Dual Degree Integrated Teacher Education Programme (ITEP): B.Sc. B.Ed. (Secondary); B.A. B.Ed. (Secondary); B.Com. B.Ed. (Secondary)

I. DETAILS OF SINGLE MAJOR PROGRAMMES IN ARTS AND SCIENCE

Following two Single Major Programmes are offered with Arts and Science as two disciplines (with a Major and Minor subjects) under FYUP in the University:

1. Four Year Bachelor's Degree in Arts (Honours/Honours with Research) with Major Subject

The following subjects are offered under the Arts Discipline: Anthropology, Défense Studies, Drawing & Painting, Economics, English, Geography, Hindi, History, Home Science, Mathematics, Music, Philosophy, Political Science, Psychology, Sanskrit, Sociology, Statistics, Education (in affiliated college/institute only)

2. Four Year Bachelor's Degree in Science (Honours/Honours with Research) with Major Subject

The following subjects are offered under the Science Discipline: Anthropology, Biochemistry, Biotechnology, Botany, Chemistry, Computer Science, Défense Studies, Geography, Geology, Microbiology, Mathematics, Physics, Statistics, Zoology

Note: The above Multidisciplinary Programmes also contains common courses (VAC and AEC)

Four Year Bachelor's Degree (Multidisciplinary Programme)

A four-year Bachelor's degree with Honours shall be awarded upon the successful completion of 176 academic credits, in either of the two aforementioned multidisciplinary programmes. Students will have the flexibility to choose any three subjects within their core disciplines along with the MD/ID subject under the selected programme. A minimum of 88 credits must be earned in the subjects belonging to the student's Major.

Major and Minor (Four-Year Bachelor's Degree with Honours)

A student enrolled in a four-year undergraduate programme studying two core subjects (Major and Minor) in the first year, and pursuing one of these subjects as the Major in the second, third and fourth year, shall be eligible for the award of a Bachelor's Degree with Honours with that Major subject upon successful completion

of the eighth semester. This is subject to the condition that the student has earned a minimum of 88 credits (i.e. 50% of the total credits of the programme) in the Major subject out of the total 176 credits required for the programme.

These 88 credits must be accumulated through Discipline Specific Core/Core Courses (DSC/CC), Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) related to the core subject, Discipline Specific Electives (DSE), Project report and Field Visit/Vocational/Internship course related to the Major Subject.

Example: A student pursuing a B.A. (Honours) programme with History and Political Science as core subjects and further Sociology and Economics as a Minor (ID/MD) shall be awarded a Major in History if she/he earns at least 88 credits from DSC/CC, SEC (History-related), DSE courses, Project report, Field Visit/Vocational/Internship course in History by the end of the eighth semester.

Such a student shall also be awarded a Minor in Political Science if she/he earns a minimum of 24 credits in 8 semesters through DSC/CC, SEC (Political Science-related) and minor courses of Political Science (Offered in III to VIII semesters).

Furthermore, the student will be awarded a Minor in Sociology or Economics (which is her/his ID/MD subject in this example) upon earning minimum 24 credits in Sociology or Economics over the span of eight semesters. This includes completing the ID/MD Sociology and Economics courses in the first four semesters, as well as the Minor courses offered under Sociology and Economics in the VII and VIII semesters.

Guidelines for Selecting a Minor in the Fourth Year (VII & VIII semester)

In the fourth year (VII and VIII semester) of the FYUP, students may choose their Minor course from the following:

- A Discipline Specific Core subject that was studied up to the third year as a minor (i.e., until the VI semester).
- Interdisciplinary (ID) or Multidisciplinary (MD) subjects studied during the first and second year.

If a student opts for a Minor in a particular subject, she/he must undertake the Minor courses offered under the same subject in both the VII and VIII semesters.

Major and Minor (Four-Year Bachelor's Degree–Honours with Research)

A student enrolled in a four-year undergraduate programme studying two core subjects (Major and Minor) in the first year, and pursuing one of these subjects as the Major in the second, third and fourth year, shall be eligible for the award of a Bachelor's Degree (Honours with Research) with that Major subject upon successful completion of the eighth semester. This is subject to the condition that the student has earned a minimum of 88 credits in the Major subject out of the total 176 credits required for the programme.

These 88 credits must be accumulated through Discipline-Specific Core/Core Courses (DSC/CC), Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) related to the core subject, Discipline-Specific Electives (DSE), a project report, field visits/vocational/internship courses related to the Core subject, Research methodology, and a dissertation on the chosen major subject.

Example: A student pursuing a B.Sc. (Honours with Research) in Physics and Mathematics as Core subjects and, Statistics and Chemistry as a Minor (ID/MD) subject, will be awarded a Major in Physics if she/he successfully completes at least 88 credits through DSC/CC, SEC (Physics-related), DSE courses, Project report, Field Visit/ Vocational/ Internship course of Physics, Research Methodology Course and writes dissertation (12 Credits) on the Physics.

Such a student shall also be awarded a Minor in MAThematics if she/he earns a minimum of 24 credits in period of 8 semesters through DSC/CC, SEC (Chemistry-related) and minor courses of Mathematics (offered in III & VIII semesters).

Furthermore, the student will be awarded a Minor in Statistics/Chemistry (which is her/his ID/MD subject in this example) upon earning 24 credits in Statistics/Chemistry over the span of eight semesters. This includes completing the ID/MD Statistics/Chemistry courses in the first four semesters, as well as the Minor courses offered under Statistics/Chemistry in the VII and VIII semesters.

Guidelines for Selecting a Minor in the Fourth Year (VII & VIII semester)

In the fourth year (VII and VIII semesters) of the FYUP, students may choose their Minor course from the following:

- A Discipline Specific Core subject that was studied up to the third year as a Minor (i.e., until the VI semester).
- Interdisciplinary (ID) or Multidisciplinary (MD) subjects studied during the first and second year.

To earn a Minor in a particular subject, a student must accumulate a minimum of 24 credits in that subject over the course of the programme. If a student opts for a Minor in a particular subject, she/he must undertake the Minor courses offered under the same subject in both the VII and VIII semesters.

Note: The Departments offering a 4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research) must have the required infrastructure such as the library, access to journals, computer lab and software, laboratory facilities to carry out experimental research work, and at least two permanent faculty members who are recognized as Ph.D. supervisors. The Departments already recognized for conducting the Ph.D. programme may conduct a 4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research) without obtaining any approval from the affiliating University.

Three Year Bachelor's Degree (Multidisciplinary Programme) (In case of Exit under FYUP)

Three-Year Bachelor's Degree (As an exit option after VI Semester under FYUP)

A student who opts to exit the Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUP) after successfully completing six semesters shall be awarded a Three-Year Bachelor's Degree with a Major in one subject, provided she/he have earned a minimum of 64 credits in the major discipline out of a total of 128 academic credits. These credits must be earned from any of the multidisciplinary undergraduate programmes offered.

In the case of a student enrolled in the FYUP with two core subjects, she/he shall be eligible for a Three-Year Bachelor's Degree with a Single Major, provided she/he have earned at least 64 credits in one Core subject (from Arts or Science disciplines). These 64 credits must be accrued through Discipline-Specific Core (DSC)/Core Courses (CC), Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC), Discipline-Specific Electives (DSE), and other related courses in the chosen major subject.

Example: If a student exits a Four-Year Bachelor's Degree programme in science (Zoology & Botany as Core subjects) after three years and has earned 64 credits in Zoology through DSC/CC, SEC, DSE, and other courses offered under the subject Zoology, she/he will be awarded a Three-Year Bachelor's Degree in Science with a Major in Zoology.

Similarly, the student who has studied Botany as a minor core subject shall be awarded a Minor in Botany, provided they earn a minimum of 24 credits from DSC/CC and SEC courses in Botany over the span of six semesters.

Guidelines for selecting/pursuing a Minor in the third Year

The students will have to select Minor from one of the two Core courses pursued by them in first year i.e. first 2 semesters of the FYUP.

Example: If a student has taken Botany as a minor core subject and continues with it as a minor in the second and third year, she/he shall be awarded a Minor in Botany, provided she/he earns a minimum of 24 credits from DSC/CC and SEC courses in Botany over the span of six semesters.

Course Structure and Credit Allocation for Multidisciplinary Programmes (For Practical Based Subjects)

The following course structure under FYUP for Multidisciplinary programmes is designed for subjects which have practical based courses or have relatively larger emphasis on practical course-based learning:

Fourth Year (NHEQF Level-6)

In the fourth Year of Four-Year Undergraduate Program (FYUP) two types of programmes are offered:

1. UG with Honours

2. UG Honours with Research

Candidates with a **minimum CGPA of 7.5** will be eligible to continue their studies into the fourth year of the undergraduate program, leading to a four-year Bachelor's degree (Honours with Research).

Fourth Year UG (Honours)

Credit Requirement for Minor: To earn a Minor in a particular subject, a student must accumulate a minimum of 24 credits in that subject over the duration of the programme.

Alternatively, if the same student had studied Sociology/Philosophy as an Interdisciplinary (ID/MD) subject in the first and second year, she/he may opt for Sociology or Philosophy as Minor in the VII & VIII semesters i.e. fourth year.

Credit Requirement for Minor: To earn a Minor in a particular subject, a student must accumulate a minimum of 24 credits in that subject over the course of the programme.

II. OTHER PROGRAMMES WITH SINGLE MAJOR

Following four Programmes are offered under FYUP in the University with single Major:

1. Four Year Bachelor's Degree in Commerce (Honours/ Honours with Research)
2. Four Year Bachelor's Degree in Business Administration (Honours/ Honours with Research) [only in Affiliated college]
3. Four Year Bachelor's Degree in Yogic Sciences (Honours/Honours with Research)
4. Four Year Bachelor's Degree in Journalism and Mass Communication (Honours/ Honours with Research)

Note: The above Programmes also contains common courses (VAC and AEC)

Four Year Bachelor's Degree Programme with Single Major

A four-year Bachelor's degree (with Honours) in the aforementioned programmes shall be awarded upon successful completion of **176 academic credits**.

Major and Minor (Four-Year Bachelor's Degree with Honours)

A student enrolled in a four-year undergraduate programme with a single core subject/discipline shall be awarded a Bachelor's degree with Honours and a Major in that subject upon successful completion of the eighth semester, provided they earn a minimum of 88 credits in the core subject out of the total 176 credits.

These 88 credits must be accumulated through Discipline Specific Core/Core Courses (DSC/CC), Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) related to the core subject, Discipline Specific Electives (DSE), Project report and Field Visit/Vocational/Internship course and other courses related to the Major Subject.

Example: A student pursuing a B.Com. (Honours) programme with Commerce as the Major Core subject and Financial Management and Business Economics as Minor Core subjects, along with Gender Studies as an Interdisciplinary/Multidisciplinary Minor, will be awarded a Major in Commerce if she/he earns at least 88 credits through DSC/CC, SEC (Commerce-related), DSE courses, project work, field visits, vocational courses,

or internships related to Commerce by the end of the eighth semester.

Such a student shall also be awarded a Minor in Business Economics if she/he earns a minimum of 24 credits in 8 semesters through DSC/CC, SEC (Business Economics -related) and minor courses of Business Economics. (offered in I to VIII semesters).

Furthermore, the student will be awarded a Minor in Gender Studies (which is her/his ID/MD subject in this example) upon earning 24 credits in Gender Studies over the span of eight semesters. This includes completing the ID/MD Gender Studies courses in the first four semesters, as well as the Minor courses offered under Gender studies in the VII and VIII semesters.

Major/ Minor under Four-Year Bachelor's Degree (Honours with Research)

A four-year Bachelor's degree (Honours with Research) in the aforementioned programmes shall be awarded upon successful completion of 176 academic credits.

A student enrolled in a four-year undergraduate programme with a single core subject/discipline shall be awarded a Bachelor's degree with Honours and Research with a Major in that subject upon successful completion of the eighth semester, provided they earn a minimum of 88 credits in the core major discipline out of the total 176 credits.

These 88 credits must be accumulated through Discipline Specific Core/Core Courses (DSC/CC), Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) related to the core subject, Discipline Specific Electives (DSE), Project report and Field Visit/Vocational/Internship course related to the Major Subject, Research Methodology Course including the Dissertation worth 12 credits, aligned with the Core major subject.

Example: A student pursuing a B.Com. (Honours) programme with Commerce as the Major Core subject and Financial Management and Business Economics as Minor Core subjects, along with Gender Studies as an Interdisciplinary/Multidisciplinary Minor, will be awarded a Major in Commerce upon successful completion of at least 88 credits. These credits must be earned through DSC/CC, SEC, and DSE courses in Commerce, a project report, field visits/vocational training/internships related to the major subject, a course in research methodology, and the successful submission of a dissertation in the field of Commerce.

Such a student shall also be awarded a Minor in Business Economics if they earn a minimum of 24 credits in 8 semesters through DSC/CC, SEC (Business Economics-related) and minor courses of Business Economics (offered in I to VIII semesters).

Furthermore, the student will be awarded a Minor in Gender studies (which is his/her ID/MD subject in this example) upon earning 24 credits in Gender studies over the span of eight semesters. This includes completing the ID/MD. Gender Studies courses in the first four semesters, as well as the Minor courses offered under Gender Studies in the VII and VIII semesters.

Note: The Departments offering a 4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research) must have the required infrastructure such as the library, access to journals, computer lab and software, laboratory facilities to carry out experimental research work, and at least two permanent faculty members who are recognized as Ph.D. supervisors. The Departments already recognized for conducting the Ph.D. programme may conduct a 4-year UG Degree (Honours with Research) without obtaining any approval from the affiliating University.

Three Years Under Graduate Programme with Single Major (In Case of Exit)

Major and Minor under Three-Year Bachelor's Degree (Exit Option after VI Semester)

A student who chooses to exit the programme after the successful completion of the sixth semester shall be awarded a Three-Year Bachelor's Degree, provided they have earned a minimum of 128 academic credits.

A student pursuing a three-year undergraduate programme with a single core subject/discipline shall be awarded a Bachelor's Degree in that discipline, upon exit after the sixth semester. To be awarded a Major, the student

must have earned at least 64 credits out of the total 128 credits from the Core subject. These credits must be accumulated through Discipline Specific Core/Core Courses (DSC/CC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC), Discipline-Specific Electives (DSE), Project report and Field Visit/Vocational/Internship course related to the Major Subject.

Example: A student pursuing a B.Com. (Honours) programme with Commerce as the Major Core subject and Business Economics and Financial Management as Minor Core subject and further Gender Studies as Minor (ID/MD subject) shall be awarded a Major in Commerce if she/he earns a minimum of 64 credits from DSC/CC and SEC courses, Discipline-Specific Electives (DSE), Project report and Field Visit/Vocational courses/Internship in Commerce.

Additionally, the student may be awarded a Minor in another discipline (e.g., Business Economics) if she/he earns at least 24 credits in a Minor subject.

Guidelines for Selecting a Minor in the Fourth Year:

In the fourth year (VII and VIII semesters) of the FYUP, students may choose their Minor course from the following:

- Interdisciplinary (ID) or Multidisciplinary (MD) subject studied during the first and second year (I to IV semesters) **Or**
- A minor subject studied up to the third year (i.e., until the VI semester).

If a student opts for a Minor in a particular subject in the fourth year of FYUP, she/he must undertake the Minor courses offered under that subject in both the VII and VIII semesters.

Example: If a student was enrolled in a 4-year undergraduate programme with Commerce as Core Major subject and Financial Management and Business Economics as Minor subjects, and further she/he has opted Business Economics as Minor, then in this case the student will have the option to pursue Business Economics as her/his Minor in the VII and VIII semesters of fourth year.

Alternatively, if the same student had studied Gender Studies as an Interdisciplinary (ID/MD) subject in the first and second year, she/he may opt for Gender Studies as Minor in the VII & VIII semesters i.e. fourth year.

The student shall have the option to select the Interdisciplinary (ID) subject—previously not continued as a Minor—for continuation under the MD/ID category in the second year and fourth year (For instance, Financial Management as mentioned in the above example).

Credit Requirement for Minor: To earn a Minor in a particular subject, a student must accumulate a minimum of 24 credits in that subject over the course of the programme.

Guidelines for Selecting a Minor in the Fourth Year:

In the fourth year (VII and VIII semesters) of the FYUP, students may choose their Minor course from the following:

- Interdisciplinary (ID) or Multidisciplinary (MD) subject studied during the first and second year (I to IV semesters) **Or**
- A minor subject studied up to the third year (i.e., until the VI semester).

If a student opts for a Minor in a particular subject in the fourth year of FYUP, she/he must undertake the Minor courses offered under that subject in both the VII and VIII semesters.

Example: If a student was enrolled in a 4-year undergraduate programme with Commerce as Core Major subject and Financial Management and Business Economics as Minor subjects, and further she/he has opted Business Economics as Minor, then in this case the student will have the option to pursue Business Economics as Minor in the VI and VIII semesters of fourth year.

Alternatively, if the same student had studied Gender Studies as an Interdisciplinary (ID/MD) subject in the first and second year, she/he may opt for Gender Studies as Minor in the VII & VIII semesters i.e. fourth year.

The student shall have the option to select the Interdisciplinary (ID) subject—previously not continued as a Minor—for continuation under the MD/ID category in the second year and fourth year (For instance, Financial Management as mentioned in the above example).

Credit Requirement for Minor: To earn a Minor in a particular subject, a student must accumulate a minimum of 24 credits in that subject over the course of the programme.

III. DUAL MAJOR-INTEGRATED DEGREE PROGRAMME

Following Dual Major Integrated Programme under NEP 2020 is offered under FYUP in the University:

Four Years Dual Degree Integrated Teacher Education Programme (ITEP): B.Sc. B.Ed. (Secondary); B.A. B.Ed. (Secondary); B.Com. B.Ed. (Secondary)

The ITEP is of four years duration across eight semesters of study. It is a dual-major bachelor's degree programme with one Major in Education and the other in a disciplinary (B.A., B.Sc., or B.Com.) branch of knowledge.

The ITEP envisages multiple entry and exit points and re-entry options, with appropriate certifications. Student-teachers who wish to exit after completion of one year (two semesters) of study will be given a Certificate in their Major (discipline) indicating the credits accrued for the courses pursued. Student-teachers who wish to exit after completion of two years (four semesters) will be given a Diploma in their Major (discipline), indicating the credits accrued for the courses completed.

Student-teachers who wish to exit after successful completion of three years (six semesters) will be awarded a Bachelor's Degree in the chosen Major area of study upon securing a minimum of 120 credits and satisfying the minimum credit requirements of 48 credits for the Major.

Student-teachers who successfully complete four years (eight semesters) of study will be awarded a dual-major bachelor's degree, B.A. B.Ed. or B.Sc. B.Ed. or B.Com. B.Ed. upon securing a minimum of 160 credits, (maximum 176) including a minimum of 80 credits for the first major (i.e. in education), and a minimum of 48 credits for the second major in a disciplinary area relating to one of the curricular areas in school education (Botany, Chemistry, Mathematics, Physics and Zoology for B.Sc.; Drawing & Painting, Economics, Geography, History and Political Science for B.A., and Business Studies for B.Com.).

BROAD CATEGORY OF SUBJECTS

The subjects have been classified into eight distinct groups to facilitate more meaningful and academically productive combinations for students. However, selection from these groups remains advisory and flexible, allowing students the autonomy to explore interdisciplinary interests.

I. Two Subjects (01-Major and 01-Minor)

In the first semester, students are advised to select one Major and one Minor subject, preferably from the same subject group. However, if a student wishes to, or if the department/institution is unable to offer both subjects from the same group, the student may choose one subject from a different group. This flexibility is limited to combinations within Group 1, 2 & 3 or within Group 4 & 5 only.

SUBJECT GROUPS

1. Natural and Physical Sciences: Zoology, Chemistry, Botany, Biochemistry, Physics, Biotechnology, Microbiology, Geology, Geography, Anthropology

2. Mathematical, Statistics, and Computational Sciences: Mathematics, Statistics, Computer Science, Physics, Chemistry, Defence Studies

3. Earth Science: Geology, Geography, Defence Studies

4. Humanities and Social Sciences: Sociology, Political Science, Economics, History, Défense Studies, Psychology, Philosophy, Anthropology, Education, Home Science, Geography

5. Art and Languages: Hindi, English, Sanskrit, Drawing and Painting, Music, Home Science

6. Management and Commerce

7. Yogic Sciences

8. Information and Media Sciences

II. Multidisciplinary/Interdisciplinary Subjects (Two-02)

SELECTION OF MAJOR AND MINOR FROM THE SUBJECT GROUP(S)

Student will select the 02 MD/ID from any one or more broad subject category from which Major and Minor has been selected, i.e. within 1,2,3 or within 4 & 5 subject.

Students are not allowed to take the same courses studied in the 12th class under the Multidisciplinary subject (MD /Interdisciplinary (ID) category.

Second Year (FYUP)

Major & Minor: After the successful completion of II semester the student will pursue one Major and one Minor as selected in the first year.

Major & Minor: In case of MD and ID the student will only continue with one MD/ID course in the second year.

POSTGRADUATE (PG) PROGRAMMES UNDER NEP 2020

[w.e.f. ACADEMIC SESSION 2025-26]

Categories of PG Programmes

1-Year PG Programme: Students who hold a 4-year undergraduate degree with Honours or Honours with Research (excluding B.Tech./ B.E. degrees) shall be eligible to enroll in a 1-year postgraduate (PG) programme in their respective or related disciplines.

2-Year PG Programme: Students who did not pursue or are not eligible to pursue the 4-year undergraduate programme (Honours/Honours with Research) will have the opportunity to enrol in a 2-year postgraduate (PG) programme upon completion of their three-year undergraduate degree.

Additionally, students who have completed professional undergraduate degrees, such as B.E. or B.Tech., will have to enrol in a 2-year PG programme to pursue postgraduate studies in their respective disciplines.

5-year Integrated Programme (UG+PG): At the PG level, the curricular component of 5-year integrated programme will be similar to that of 2-year PG programme mentioned above.

Duration of the PG Programmes

The PG will be of 1-year, 2-year, and an integrated 5-year with multiple entry and exit options after fulfilling the required conditions as per “Curriculum and Credit Framework for Postgraduate Programmes” of University Grants Commission. The maximum duration to earn/complete any post graduate degree will be as follows:

- For 2-year PG programme the maximum duration will be four years.
- For 1-year PG programme the maximum duration will be three years.
- For an Integrated 5-year programme the maximum duration will be eight years

NOTE: 1-YEAR PG PROGRAMME WILL BE IMPLEMENTED IN THE UNIVERSITY FROM ACADEMIC SESSION 2026-27.

Description of PG Programmes

The PG programmes will be aligned with the **National Higher Education Qualification Framework (NHEQF)** levels, as detailed below:

NHEQF Level-6

Postgraduate Diploma: *duration:* One year (two semesters) for those who exit after successful completion of the first year (two semesters) of the 2-year Master’s degree programme.

NHEQF Level-6.5

2-year PG: Master’s degree. (e.g. M.A., M.Com., M.Sc., etc.) *duration:* Two years (four semesters) after obtaining a 3-year Bachelor’s degree (e.g. B.A., B.Sc., B.Com. etc.).

NHEQF Level-6.5

1-year PG: Master’s degree. (e.g. M.A., M.Com., M.Sc., etc.) *duration:* One year (two semesters) after obtaining a 4-year Bachelor’s degree (Honours/ Honours with Research) (e.g. B.A., B.Sc., B.Com. etc.).

5-year Integrated (UG+PG): *duration:* five years (ten semesters) after successfully completing secondary education (Grade 12 of school education). At the PG level, the curricular component of 5- year integrated will be similar to that of 2-year PG programme mentioned above.

NHEQF Level-7

2-Year PG: Master’s degree (e.g. M.E./M.Tech. etc.) *duration:* Two years (four semesters) after obtaining a 4-year Bachelor’s degree. (e.g. B.E./B.Tech. etc.).

Multiple Entry and Multiple Exit

In accordance with the Multiple Entry and Exit provisions outlined in the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, students will be offered flexible exit and re-entry options aligned with the corresponding National Higher Education Qualification Framework (NHEQF) levels and their respective academic requirements.

Postgraduate Diploma (NHEQF Level-6)

- ❖ duration: One year (two semesters)
- ❖ Requirements for earning **PG Diploma**: For those who exit after successful completion of the first year (two semesters) of the 2-year Master's degree programme i.e., securing minimum 48 credits.

2-Year PG (NHEQF Level-6.5) [e.g. M.A., M.Com., M.Sc., etc.]

- ❖ duration and eligibility for entry: Two years (four semesters); for students who have obtained a 3-year Bachelor's degree.
- ❖ Requirements for earning **2-Year Masters's Degree**: For those who successfully completes Two years (four semesters) of the 2-year Master's degree programme i.e., securing minimum 96 credits.

1-Year PG (NHEQF Level-6.5) [e.g. M.A., M.Com., M.Sc., etc.]

- ❖ duration and eligibility for entry: One year (Two semesters), for students who have obtained a 4 -year Bachelor's degree (Honours/ Honours with Research),
- ❖ Requirements for earning **1-Year Masters's Degree**: For those who successfully completes one year (two semesters) of the 1-year Master's degree programme i.e., securing minimum 48 credits.

Masters's Degree (NHEQF Level-7) [e.g. M.E., M.Tech. etc.]

- ❖ duration and eligibility for entry: Two year (Four semesters), for students who have obtained a 4 -year Bachelor's degree (B.E. B.Tech., etc)
- ❖ Requirements for earning **Masters's Degree**: For those who successfully completes two years (four semesters) of the 2-year Master's degree programme i.e., securing minimum 96 credits.

Procedure for applying for exit from PG

The student after attaining minimum 48 credits may in writing request for an exit after One-year of 2-Year PG programme to HoD/ Dean of their respective school. Such applications shall be forwarded by HoD/Dean to the Controller of Examinations for further necessary action.

Categories of Students Eligible for Entry and Re-entry under the PG

Entry and Re-entry options in the PG will be for the following categories of students:

First Category: Students who were earlier pursuing **2-Year PG** from HNB Garhwal University (HNBGU) and exited the in between and have re-entered without further advancement in the same in HNBGU. **Example:** A student exited the M.Sc. Chemistry after successfully completing first year (M.Sc. I Year i.e. 1st and 2nd semesters) from HNBGU and requested for re-entry after two years in second year (M.Sc. II Year i.e. 3rd semester) of the same PG in HNBGU.

Second Category: Students who were pursuing PG from universities other than HNBGU and have requested for entry in second year of PG of HNBGU.

Entry and Re-entry Criteria for different Categories of Students

1. The maximum duration to earn any postgraduate degree will be as follows:
 - a. For 2-year PG programme the maximum duration will be four years;
 - b. For 1-year PG programme the maximum duration will be three years, including the time spent in other Universities under same PG.
2. In case of first category students the re-entry will be directly provided to the students.

3. In case of second category of students, the University Department level committee headed by Head of the Department/ Dean of the School will scrutinize the courses pursued by the student in other universities and will match them with the admissible Core Courses offered by HNBGU under the same NHEQF levels. If the courses match is 70% or more of the total admissible Core Courses offered by HNBGU the student will be allowed to enter the PG programme in HNBGU. The entry will be provided subject to the availability/vacancy of the seats under the different categories.

If the courses match is less than 70% of the admissible total Core Courses offered by HNBGU the student will not be allowed to enter into the PG programme in HNBGU.

Procedure for applying for entry from PG programme

The student after attaining the required credits applying for entry/re-entry may have to give in writing an application to Registrar, HNBGU along with following documents:

1. Marksheet/Course Certificate/Diploma etc. of Last session of PG programme completed

The same request will be thereby forwarded to the Dean of the related School for further necessary action.

Note: The University holds the right to modify and upgrade the entry and exit procedure and other requirements, which will be duly uploaded in the University Website.

Eligibility for admission in First semester of PG programme

- (i) In case of PG programme, no student shall be eligible for admission unless he/she has successfully passed the Three Year UG or Four-Year UG programme from the University recognized by the Central/State Governments for this purpose or its equivalent.
- (ii) Minimum pass percentage in pre-PG class for admission in the first semester of PG programme under different caste categories will be as per the recommendations of the admission committee.

Basic description of eligibility for PG programme

- (i) The students having 4-Year UG Degree (Honours with Research/ Honours) will have an option to get enrolled in 1-Year PG Programme.
- (ii) Those students who have passed 3-Year UG programme and do not opt for/or are not eligible for 4 years UG (Honours/ Honours with Research) will have the option to get enrolled in 2-Year PG programme.
- (iii) In case of exit after successful completion (securing minimum 48 credits) of first year of the 2-Year PG Programme, the student will get a Post-Graduate Diploma in concerned discipline.

Learning mode

Following will be the learning mode in the PG programme:

- All courses may be conducted in blended mode, i.e., 80% offline and 20% online in Master's Degree.
- Courses will be taught through Lectures, Tutorials and Practical/ field-based studies.
- Departments may offer SWAYAM/ MOOCs Courses, provided the credits from such courses should not exceed the 40% of the total credits under a programme.
- Students may opt for MOOC course to earn required or extra credits.

Note: The University will have the right to change/modify the /course structure or other information mentioned in prospectus as per UGC guidelines or NEP suggested framework in future.

COURSE STRUCTURE AND CREDIT DISTRIBUTION FOR PG PROGRAMME

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REGISTRATION AND ADMISSION PROCESS ON SAMARTH PORTAL

SAMARTH E-GOV ADMISSION PORTAL

The Hemvati Nandan Bahuguna Garhwal University (HNBGU) manages and facilitates the admission process to all undergraduate (UG), postgraduate (PG), diploma, PG Diploma and Ph.D. Programmes through centralized **SAMARTH e-Gov Admission Portal/Platform**.

It is mandatory for all the applicants to register on SAMARTH Portal for admission in HNBGU.

Steps for Student Registration on SAMARTH Portal:

1. Visit the HNBGU SAMARTH Admission Portal.
2. Click on “**New Registration**” or use the credentials for login on to the Portal.
3. After logging in, Fill up your Profile detail:

It includes all the personal details regarding category, place of birth, family, address etc.

Note: Check thoroughly all the entries of your profile details before final submission. Once submitted, editing will not be permitted.

4. **Programme Selection:**

Choose the programme you want to apply→ Fill up all your details like personal, academic, others, and upload the required documents→ Pay the application fee online.

Applicant should read the Admission Prospectus carefully regarding the eligibility of the programme. For example, for those who apply for LL.M, should have LL.B in bachelor degree.

Note: Check thoroughly all the entries of your profile details before final submission. Once submitted, editing will not be permitted.

5. If you want to apply for more than one programme, repeat the step 4 only. Steps 1 to 3 need not to be repeated. You need to pay application fee as per the instruction issued by the University. Applicant cannot apply for more than three (03) programmes.

Note: Students are required to complete the registration process on or before the specified deadline to ensure uninterrupted access to academic services.

After the successful registration, the concerned authority of the University will review and verify the submitted application forms. In accordance with the admission policy for the academic session, the Admission Committee constituted for various Programmes/Courses shall shortlist the eligible applicants and prepare merit lists for admission. The shortlisted applicants are then required to log in to the Admission Portal and complete the Admission Process by paying the prescribed fee online.

Student Life Cycle (SLC) in SAMARTH e-Gov Portal

The Student Life Cycle (SLC) module on the SAMARTH e-Gov Portal at Hemvati Nandan Bahuguna Garhwal University, Srinagar Garhwal, Uttarakhand offers a comprehensive digital platform to manage a student's academic journey from their Admission to the award of the Degree/Diploma. This system ensures transparency, efficiency, and accessibility to both students as well as the University Administrators.

Key Features of the Student Life Cycle at HNBGU

1. Mandatory Registration for New Students

- All newly admitted students in undergraduate, postgraduate, diploma, PG diploma, and integrated courses are required to register on the SAMARTH Student Portal.
- Use your assigned enrollment number to initiate registration.
- After registration, link your Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) ID with your SAMARTH account.

2. Academic Management

- Access to course details, examination schedules, results, and credit scores.
- Ability to fill out examination forms and download admit cards online.

3. Feedback Mechanism

- Students can provide feedback on courses and faculty through the Feedback Management System (FMS), enhancing the quality of education.

4. Integration with Learning Management System (LMS)

Seamless access to the university's LMS for course materials, assignments, and other learning resources.

GUIDELINES FOR ADMISSION

1. The applicants seeking admission to a Programme of Study offered by the University are advised to read all the admission rules and fee structure carefully before filling up the admission form and electing subject(s) of choice.
2. The applicants must attach Migration Certificate/Transfer Certificate and Character Certificate, issued by the institution last attended (in case of candidates passing the qualifying examination as regular student) and Character Certificate issued by a Gazetted Officer/ MP/ MLA/ The Principal or Proctor of a Degree or Post Graduate College (in case of passing the qualifying examination as private candidate or in the distance learning mode) in original and self-attested copies/authenticated photocopies of mark sheets and certificates/ degrees of all preceding examinations passed, merit-certificates, sports certificates and other relevant documents along with the admission form.
3. The applicants seeking the benefit of reservation of seats in admission to the various programmes offered by the University available to persons belonging to the SC/ST/OBC/EWS/Persons with Disabilities, etc. categories, shall attach the attested/authenticated photocopy of the certificate issued by the SDM/DM/CMO, as the case may be, in the prescribed format.
4. The applicants must affix latest and self-attested coloured passport-sized photograph in the space provided in the admission form.
5. As per the existing rules, the Admission Committee will consider a student for admission on the basis of the verification of the attested documents submitted by applicant.
6. The applicants must appear personally before the Admission Committee along with all the original certificates and testimonials for the verification of her/his academic records and identity.
7. The applicants are advised to submit their admission applications in the prescribed admission form well before the last date. No admission application shall be entertained after the given due date. However, persons rehabilitated from Kashmir shall be allowed a relaxation of up to one month in respect of the said last date.
8. Incomplete admission applications or admission applications not filled in the prescribed admission format or admission applications without required documents mentioned in the above instruction (2), shall not be entertained for admission.
9. The various professional and vocational programmes/courses offered by the University in self-financed mode in the campuses shall be made available in a campus only if ten or more applicants seek admission to the same. In case, the number of applicants seeking admission to the said programmes/courses in a campus is less than ten in respect of a particular programme, the same shall not be made available in the campus concerned. However, subject to their fulfilling the merit criteria and the availability of seats, applicants desirous of pursuing the concerned programme would be given an opportunity to join it in the campus in which it is available.
10. Admission to the various programmes offered by the University shall be granted on the basis of either the performance of the applicant in the entrance examination held for the purpose, or the counseling held in pursuance of the declaration of the results of the various common admission tests/examinations, such as, CUET, UET, JEE Main or the relative merit of the various applicants. The method to be employed for granting admissions may vary from School to School and Programme to Programme.

11. The manner of determining the relative merit of the applicants seeking admission to a Programme in which admission is to be granted on the basis of merit shall be decided and notified by the appropriate authority/officer of the University in view of the number of seats fixed for the Programme/Course and the same shall be taken to be the basis for granting/denying admission to the Programme/Course concerned in respect of all the three campuses of the University.
12. The number of admissions to be granted to a Programme/Course offered by the University shall not exceed the number of seats assigned to and available in the Programme/Course. The number of seats fixed for a Programme/Course in a given academic session shall not be increased during the session under any circumstances.
13. No applicant shall be admitted to any Programme/Course offered by the University after the expiry of the notified last date for admissions to the same and the said last date of admission shall not be extended even if all the available seats in a given Programme/Course may not have been filled and some seats might be vacant after the expiry of the last date of admission.
14. If the applicant produces false document or misleads the University with false facts, the University shall have the right to deny admission or cancel the admission granted to an applicant without any further clarification.
15. Every applicant granted admission shall deposit the prescribed one-time annual fee, tuition fee for 6 months/12 months, examination fee, etc., before the notified last date of admission. If the said fee is not deposited by the last date, the admission granted to student will stand cancelled automatically.
16. For UG classes (1st semester of B.A., B.Sc., B.Com. etc.), change of subject is allowed only on the availability of seats in the concerned subject within 15 days from the date of admission on the recommendation of Head of the Department and Dean of the School. However, such change shall be allowed on the fulfillment of eligibility, availability of seats, based on merit and through the counseling board for the Course/Subject.
17. Subject to the restrictions regarding permissible combinations of elective subjects at the UG level specified in this Admission Prospectus, a student seeking admission to B.A. or B.Sc. 1st Semester may choose one or more elective subjects from different Schools; and in such events, a student shall be for administrative purposes, deemed to be the student of the School from which she/he might have chosen the majority of the subjects offered. However, in cases where a student may choose one subject each from three different schools, she/he shall be required to indicate in the admission form the name of the School under the administrative supervision of which she/he might desire to pursue the programme concerned.
18. The applicants admitted to a School in accordance with the provisions of instruction mentioned above in point no 17, shall not be permitted to change their preference of School indicated in the admission form once admission is granted.
19. **Fractional rounding up shall not be admissible for calculating the minimum eligibility criteria, i.e., 44.9% or 39.9% shall not be treated as 45% or 40%, respectively.**
20. Campus transfer shall not be allowed in 1st year of admission.

IMPORTANT ADMISSION RULES

1. Applicants who might have appeared in compartment/supplementary examination may apply for admission. However, such applicants shall be considered for admission subject to clearing their compartment/supplementary examination, only if they might have submitted their admission forms well in time and their final result might have been declared before preparing final merit list for admission.
2. For admission to B.A. LLB., LL.B., and LL.M. minimum qualifications will be as per the latest guidelines of Bar Council of India.
3. Applicants shall have to submit all the documents mentioned in the preceding instruction (2) along with the admission form. In addition, applicants who might have passed the qualifying examination from a University other than the H.N.B. Garhwal University shall have to submit a Migration Certificate issued by the last concerned University within one month of the date on which they might be granted admission, failing which their admission shall stand cancelled automatically.
4. Applicants in full-time employment shall be considered for admission to a Programme/Course of the University only upon submission of a No Objection Certificate (NOC) issued by their employer with sanctioning of leave for total course period.
5. Five per cent (5%) campus weightage will be granted in PG Programmes to the students who have passed their UG examination from Hemvati Nandan Bahuguna Garhwal University.
6. The admission in Sports Quota will be given as five per cent (5%) seats (Supernumerary) of the total number of seats in each programme.
7. Seats shall be reserved for SC/ST/OBC candidates in all Programmes/Courses of the University in accordance with the Central Education Institutions (Reservation in Admission) Act 2006 of the Government of India, i.e., 15% for SC, 7.5% for ST and 27% for OBC candidates. In addition, horizontal reservation in each category shall be 30% for women, 5% for defense personnel and/or their dependents, 5% for persons with disabilities and 2% for dependents of freedom fighters. In case of OBC (Central list of OBCs) category candidates, they are required to produce OBC Non-Creamy Layer Certificate (OBC- NCL) issued by Competent Authority. A valid OBC-NCL certificate, issued after April 1, 2025, must be submitted at the time of counseling/admission. https://ncbc.nic.in/User_Panel/CentralListStateView.aspx
8. As per OM No. F. No.: 12-4/2019-U1 Dated 17.01.2019 of MHRD New Delhi, 10% of the total seats shall be reserved for Economically Weaker Sections (EWS) from 2019-2020. Candidates from EWS category are required to produce EWS certificate with validity at the time of admission.
9. Applicants who might have been detained or have failed in a class or might be drop-outs shall not be granted regular admission. However, they shall be permitted to appear at the annual/semester examinations for the class concerned as ex-students. The expression 'drop-outs' means, students who might have attended their classes regularly throughout an academic session after being granted admission, but could have not been able to appear for the annual/semester examinations on account of a valid and acceptable reason. However, only such students will treated to be ex-student, who might have put in the prescribed minimum attendance during the academic session concerned and had been allotted a roll number mentioned on the duly issued admit card for the annual/semester examination of the University.

10. Applicant who might have been punished for adopting unfair means in an examination or convicted by a Court of Law for a crime committed by her/him, or expelled/rusticated by the University or found guilty of indulging in ragging in the institution(s) attended by her/him prior to seeking admission to the University shall not be granted admission to any Programme/Course of the University.
11. Students indulging in activities in the campus that are considered to be improper, unwarranted, amounting to a breach of discipline or a violation of the rules and regulations of the University in the opinion of the Proctor Board, shall be liable for being expelled / rusticated or being denied admission in the next academic session.
12. An applicant may be granted admission to a course of the University even if her/his more than two (02) years might have elapsed since having passed the qualifying examination subject to satisfying his/her other conditions for admission. However, applicants falling in this category shall have to submit an affidavit stating the reasons for the existing gap in studies to the satisfaction of the competent authorities of the University.
13. Applicants will not be granted admission to the same class as might have been passed by them even with a change in subject(s) studied or school for under graduate classes. This means, for example, that a student who might have passed B.Sc. will not be granted admission to B.Sc. with a different combination of subjects or B.A./B.Com. However, for PG classes, after passing PG in one subject, the applicant may be granted admission in another subject/stream/course only if he/she fulfills all the requirements, eligibility, and merit for admission.
14. Applicants who might have passed the first/second year examination in case of the undergraduate classes and the first-year examination in case of the post-graduate classes as ex-students, may be granted admission to the second/third year of the classes concerned, as the case may be, subject to their fulfilling the minimum eligibility criteria and the availability of seats in the class to which admission might have been sought.
15. Students admitted to the University may avail the facility of studying as regular students for a maximum allowed period as per follows:
 - (a) All UG Programmes, except B.Ed. and B.P.Ed. – Programme Duration + 2 years
 - (b) All PG Programmes, except M.Ed. and M.P.Ed. – Programme Duration + 2 years
 - (c) B.Ed. and B.P.Ed. – Programme Duration + 1 year
 - (d) M.Ed. and M.P.Ed. – Programme Duration + 1 year
 - (e) A student admitted to a programme/course of the University as well as a registered research scholar of the University is barred from taking admission to any other educational institution or programme/course or to appear for any examination for the award of a Degree/Diploma/Certificate other than the examination for the programme/course to which she/he might have been admitted with the exception of "Add-on Courses" recognized as such by the University and courses offered in the distance mode of learning by recognized Universities pending the completion of the programme/course or the conclusion of the academic session concerned. This means that no student shall be permitted to study and be examined for two Degrees/Diplomas/Certificates during a single academic session with the aforesaid exceptions. However, this clause is subject to directions issued by UGC/MoE/GOI from time to time.

- (f) Students seeking admission to the programmes/courses of the University shall be given weightage for participation in co-curricular activities to be restricted to a maximum of 5 marks in accordance with details specified below:
- (i) NSS B-Certificate or 240 hours + two Special Camps–1 mark; NSS C-Certificate–2 marks, participation in National Integration Camp/ Republic Day Parade–3 marks (maximum 3 marks in all);
 - (ii) NCC B-Certificate–1 mark; NCC C-Certificate–2 marks; Participation in Republic Day Parade (National)–3 marks; NCC Cadet of the State/National Awardee–3 marks (maximum 3 in all);
 - (iii) Students selected under Youth Festival organized by AIU-Zonal–2 marks, National–3 marks (maximum 3 marks in all);
 - (iv) Participation in sports events organized by AIU-Zonal–3 marks, National–5 marks (maximum 5 marks in all);
 - (v) Position secured in National Competitions organized by AIU or the Ministry of Parliamentary Affairs: **Individual**=First–4 marks, Second–3 marks and, Third–2 marks; **Team**=First–3, Second–2 and, Third–1 mark (maximum 4 marks in all);
 - (vi) Participation in National Level literacy/cultural/quiz competitions: **Individual**=First–4, Second–3 and Third–2 marks; **Team**=First–3, Second–2 and, Third–1 mark (maximum 4 marks in all).
 - (vii) One seat will be offered in each programme for candidates, who have participated in Asian/ Commonwealth/ Olympics Games.
- (g) Deans of all Schools/Directors of the campuses shall constitute Admission Committees under communication to the University. The constituted Admission Committees shall interview the applicants in persons for the verification of their academic credentials and identity and be responsible for admissions to the undergraduate and such other classes as might be notified/communicated separately and their decision shall be final. The decision of Principal/Campus Director/Deans shall be considered final for all admission related works.
- (h) The Deans of the Schools/Directors of the campuses shall forward to the various Heads of the departments, a list of the students admitted to the various courses offered by their respective departments under copy to the Dean of Students' Welfare (in respect of all regular and self-financed courses including Professional/Vocational Courses) indicating their category and gender within seven working days of the last date for admissions. Further, the Heads of the Departments shall ensure to place the names of the admitted students in the attendance registers for the various classes of their department. Any admissions made after the communication of such a list shall (except for persons rehabilitated from Kashmir in whose case a relaxation of one month is admissible) be deemed to be invalid.
- (i) The list of the applicants granted admission to the various classes shall be published and displayed on the notice board of the concerned School/Campus and the applicants granted admission shall have to deposit their admission and other fees by the date specified in the said list.
- (j) Students admitted to undergraduate Programme shall not be provided any slip stating the

elective subjects allowed to them but the same shall be entered in the fee receipt issued to them and shall also be mentioned in the University Identity Cards provided to them.

- (k) In the case of all Professional/Vocational Programmes/Courses including the Programmes/Courses offered by the Schools of Law and Education, the Dean of the School/Director of the Campus/Principal of the Affiliated College/Institution concerned shall prepare a list of the applicants admitted finally, indicating their merit position, category, gender, date of birth and the serial number and date of the fee receipt issued to them and submit the same to the University within one month of the last date of admissions and the examination forms of only such students shall be accepted by the University whose names are in the said list.
- (l) The academic calendar notified by the University shall be applicable to and binding on all the affiliated colleges and institutions without any distinction. However, the reservation rules shall be as per the Central Government policy for the admissions in the University campuses.
- (m) Admissions to all the Programmes/Courses shall be completed by the University and affiliated colleges/ institutions by the last date of admissions notified in respect of each course irrespective of the mode of admissions, i.e., entrance test, counseling or merit. The entrance test, if any, organized by an affiliated college/institution shall be valid only if it might have been supervised by the University.
- (n) Applicants who have appeared in the final year/final semester examination of the Programmes/Course being studied by them and whose results is awaited may appear in the entrance examination for a course (including the courses offered by the Schools of Education and Law) to which they might be aspiring to be admitted, but, they shall be considered for admission at the time of the final admission interview/counseling only if their final results are declared by then and if they produce a valid mark sheet in respect of the same.
- (o) Admissions to the Programmes/Courses offered by the School of Law shall be subject to the rules made/ communicated by the Bar Council of India from time to time in addition to the admission rules made and notified by the University.
- (p) Admissions granted to the Programmes/Courses offered by the School of Law shall not be transferable and students admitted to a particular campus or Affiliated College/Institution shall have to complete the Programmes/Course from the same Campus or Affiliated College/Institution.
- (q) Only such students will be permitted to appear in the Annual/End-Semester examinations for their respective programmes/course and who have submitted their examination forms before the last date notified by the University and have met out the requirement of the mandatory attendance during the academic session.
- (r) All applicants are advised to note that ragging has been declared to be an unlawful activity and students indulging in ragging are liable to be expelled and prosecuted under law. **In compliance of the 2nd Amendment in UGC Regulations, it is compulsory for each student and every parent to submit online undertaking every academic year at www.antiragging.in. The student will forward the received mail from anti-ragging website to the Nodal Officer of Anti-Ragging Committee of the University/College.**

- (s) The refund of caution-money/security deposited by a student may be claimed/demanded within one year after passing the final examination of the programme/course taken by her/him. After the expiry of the aforesaid period of one year, the amount deposited as caution-money/security will be forfeited automatically and shall not be refunded.

For applicants from Jammu & Kashmir/Ladakh

To create 2 seats under supernumerary quota in all recognized higher education institutions for students from J&K/Ladakh, subject to directions from UGC/MoE/GoI time to time.

GUIDELINES FOR FOREIGN NATIONALS/NRI/PIO STUDENTS SEEKING ADMISSION TO POSTGRADUATE/ UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAMMES

1. Following are the common rules of the HNB Garhwal University for Foreign Nationals/NRI/PIO - students are required to submit their academic certificates as a proof of passing the qualifying examination for each programme/course to which admission is to be sought. The minimum qualification for them would be same as applicable to the Indian students.
2. Ten percent seats over and above the total number of regular seats in each programme are reserved for the Foreign Nationals/NRI candidates.
3. Foreign Nationals/NRI candidates seeking admission to the concerned programme are required to compete amongst themselves for the seats reserved for them by appearing in the entrance test (wherever applicable) if they are in India. However, those living abroad at the time of entrance test will be exempted from the entrance test.
4. Foreign National/ Non-resident Indian candidates shall have to comply with any other requirements prescribed by the Government of India and HNB Garhwal University from time to time.
5. The candidates seeking admission to B.P.Ed. (Physical Education) will be required to undergo mandatory Physical Efficiency Test. The scores of Physical Efficiency Test will be counted for determining merit.
6. The students seeking admission under University Exchange Programme and wants to complete single semester from the university, shall be exempted from regular fee. The exemption will be applicable for that particular semester.
7. Tuition Fee: Tuition Fee structure for Foreign National/PIO/NRI candidates admitted against the seats created for them in teaching Departments will be as per fee structure prescribed by the HNB Garhwal University for Foreign National/PIO/NRI candidates.
8. Besides tuition fee, all Foreign National/PIO/NRI candidates are required to pay one time registration fee as prescribed by the HNB Garhwal University.
9. Further information on the programme/course offerings, rules and regulations, and fee structures are available on the website www.fsohnbgu.in.

GUIDELINES FOR ADMISSION ON THE BASIS OF SPORTS QUOTA

Five per cent (5%) seats (supernumerary) of the total number of seats in each programme are reserved under Sports Quota in the campuses of HNB Garhwal University. All the three campuses will follow the below mentioned guidelines for admission on the basis of Sports Quota. All the applicants applying for admission in this category shall require to meet the eligibility conditions as follows:

1. Applicants as per their age must be eligible to participate in Inter university competitions and should not be employed on Part time/Full time basis anywhere.
2. One who have represented India in the under-mentioned Competition(s), recognized and funded by the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports (MYAS) in last three years:
 - a) Olympic Games by the International Olympic Committee (IOC)
 - b) World Championship / World Cup by International Sports Federations (ISFs)
 - c) Commonwealth Games by Commonwealth Games Federation (CGF)
 - d) Asian Games by Olympic Council of Asia (OCA)
 - e) Asian Championships by International Sports Federations (ISFs)
 - f) South Asian Federation Games (SAF) by South Asian Sports Council (SASC)
 - g) World University Games (WUGs) by International University Associations (IUAs).
3. One who have got medal/position in the under-mentioned Competition(s), recognized and funded by the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports (MYAS) in last three years:
 - a) Khelo India University Games (KIUG)
 - b) Zone basis/Interzonal Competitions under AIU
 - c) Khelo India Youth Games (KIYG)
 - d) School Games Federation of India (SGFI)
4. Candidates seeking admission under Sports Quota shall be considered for admission only in the games that the university have sufficient infrastructure and facilities i.e., Athletics, Badminton, Baseball, Basketball, Best Physique, Boxing, Chess, Cricket, Cross Country, Football, Handball, Hockey, Judo, Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, Power Lifting, Shooting, Table Tennis, Tennis, Volleyball, Weight Lifting, Wrestling, Yoga.
5. The admission on the basis of Sports Quota shall be based on **direct admission** along with fitness certificate certified by Chief Medical Officer, District Hospital at the time of admission.
6. In order to be eligible in Sports Quota, a candidate should have passed the last qualifying examination and submit the **Marksheet along with Migration** in the university at the time of admission.
7. The admission of the candidates shall be provisional until the verification of sports certificates from the concerned issuing authority.
8. It is mandatory to submit an **Undertaking** on Non-Judicial Stamp Paper of Rs. 100/- by the applicant at the time of admission stating that he/she will play for the University during their study.
9. In case of more applicants applied than Sports Quota seats, the merit of the qualified candidates for the admission in Sports Quota shall be decided on the basis of certificates of achievements.
10. Applicants shall be considered for Sports Quota only on approval from the University Sports Board.

Important Notes:

1. The allotment of seat to the eligible applicant shall conform to university regulations and will be the sole responsibility of the Sports Admission Committee of the University which will include:
 - a) Chairperson: DSW/Director Physical Education
 - b) Convener: Assistant Director of Physical Education
 - c) Member/s: Teacher/s, Department of Physical Education
 - d) Game Expert: Internal/External
 - e) Vice Chancellor Nominee.
2. The Sports Admission Committee of the University shall:
 - a) Screen and collect the application form uploaded by the applicant.
 - b) Verify and Collect Self Attested copy of Merit/Participation Sports Certificate of the applicant.
 - c) Verify and Collect the Self Attested copy of marksheet of 10th, 12th, and any other last year passed examination along with the migration.
 - d) Collect the fitness certificate certified by Chief Medical Officer, District Hospital.
 - e) Collect the Undertaking/Affidavit on Non-Judicial Stamp Paper of Rs. 100/- by the applicant.
3. In Case of any dispute, it may be resolved by the Sports Admission Committee of the University. The committee decision will be final.
4. The list of finally selected applicants containing marks of the Sports Certificates, shall be displayed on the Website and Notice Board of the University for three days, to take cognizance of the grievances, if any. The Grievance Committee of the university must resolve all the grievances before admitting the applicants.
5. The list (soft and hard copy) of finally admitted applicant on the basis of Sports shall be sent to University Sports Board.
6. The University shall maintain a proper record of the applicants admitted on the basis of Sports Quota.
7. Sports Certificate of Invitational / Memorial / Open / Prize Money League / Ranking Competitions will not be considered.
8. Applicants are required to submit Self-Attested copies of the Highest Sports Certificate.

Extra Perks – 100% Scholarship for International Players and National Medal winners where their education for the course and hostel accommodation shall be provided free of cost. Other perks shall provide as per University Sports Board guidelines.

ATTENDANCE RULES

- (a) The teacher handling a course shall be responsible for maintaining a record of attendance of students who have registered for the course.
- (b) All teachers shall intimate the Head of the Department at least seven calendar days before the last instruction day in the semester, the particulars of all students who have less than 75% attendance in one or more courses.
- (c) A candidate who has less than 75% attendance shall not be permitted to sit for the End-semester examination in the course in which the shortfall exists. However, it shall be open to the concerned Dean(s) to grant exemption to a candidate who has failed to obtain the prescribed 75% attendance for valid reasons and such exemptions shall not under any circumstances be granted for attendance below 65%.
- (d) A candidate who fails to put in at least 75% attendance in I semester shall not be allowed to pursue the studies in II semester. Such candidates may apply to the Dean of the concerned school for re-registration in the I semester in the next academic session. A candidate who fails to put in at least 75% attendance in the II semester shall not be promoted to III semester. Such candidates may apply to the Dean of the school for re-registration in the II semester in the next academic session and so on and so forth.

PASS AND PROMOTION CRITERIA (UG & PG PROGRAMMES)

The following provisions shall be applicable to students admitted to the Four-Year Undergraduate programmes under National Education Policy (NEP 2020):

- (a) A student who appears in an odd semester examination or who was eligible to appear in the odd semester examinations but remains absent in any or all the papers of the said semester, shall move on to the next even semester irrespective of her/his result in the said examinations.
- (b) A student who puts in 75% attendance in I and II semesters of a UG programme separately but fails to acquire 20 credits in I and II semester examinations taken together shall not be promoted to III semester. She/He shall cease to be a regular student.
- (c) If a student is unable to obtain the minimum credit requirement for promotion to the next academic year, she/he may still be eligible for promotion provided that the total credits earned in the immediate previous year are not less than the total required credits minus the credits of any one semester of that year.
- (d) Promotion to VII semester of FYUP (Honours with Research) will be allowed only if the student gets 7.5 CGPA (75 % marks) till successful completion of all 6 semesters.
- (e) Students who do not fulfil the promotion criteria mentioned above shall be declared fail in the promotion examination of the academic year concerned. However, they shall have the option to retain the marks in the papers which they want to retain.
- (f) There will not be any provision of grace marks/grade(s) in any paper /semester exam.
- (g) The candidate obtaining Grade 'F' is considered failed and will be required to clear the arrears in the subsequent examinations within the stipulated time. A student may appear to clear the backlog in the

papers prescribed for semester I/III/V/VII only in the odd semester examinations to be held in November-December. A student who wants to appear to clear the backlog in the papers prescribed in even semester II/IV/VI/VIII may do so only in the examinations to be held in May/June.

- (h) The students who remain absent in sessional/end semester examination shall be deemed to have failed in that subject. In case of end semester examination, he/she may reappear in the failed course with maximum three attempts, as back paper examination, provided she/he pays the fees as prescribed by the University. In case of absence in sessional examination, she/he may reappear in the same semester in the immediate next academic session with a fee as prescribed by the University. Re-appearance in internal assessment for improvement shall not be allowed.
- (i) In case of practical examination/Dissertation/Field Reports the internal assessment will be based on the continuous evaluation (viva, performance in class test, maintenance of performance record, etc.) during entire semester. The internal assessment in such cases will be of 30 marks.
- (j) A candidate who passes the semester examinations in parts is eligible only for CGPA and grade but not for ranking of candidates in the University. Only the candidates who passes all the semester examinations in first attempts are eligible for ranking, when required.
- (k) There shall be no supplementary examinations.

The following provisions shall be applicable to students admitted to the Postgraduate programmes under National Education Policy (NEP 2020):

- (a) A student who appears in an odd semester examination or who was eligible to appear in the odd semester examinations but remains absent in any or all the papers of the said semester, shall move on to the next even semester irrespective of his/her result in the said examinations.
- (b) A student who puts in 75% attendance in I and II semesters of a PG programme separately but fails to acquire 24 credits in I and II semester examinations taken together shall not be promoted to III semester. She/He shall cease to be a regular student.
- (c) Subject to putting 75% attendance in Odd and even semesters, Promotion from odd semester to even semester will be automatic (i.e., from semester 1st to 2nd and from 3rd semester to 4th semester). But for promotion to next year, the minimum credit requirement will be total credits till the end of that particular year minus 24 credits (maximum arrears of credits of 1 semester is allowed), viz., minimum credit requirement for admission to 3rd semester is 24.
- (d) If a student is unable to obtain the minimum credit requirement for promotion to the next academic year, they may still be eligible for promotion provided that the total credits earned in the immediate previous year are not less than the total required credits minus the credits of any one semester of that year.
- (e) Students who do not fulfil the promotion criteria mentioned above shall be declared fail in the promotion examination of the academic year concerned. However, they shall have the option to retain the marks in the papers which they want to retain.
- (f) There will not be any provision of grace marks/grade(s) in any paper / semester exam.
- (g) The candidate obtaining Grade 'F' is considered failed and will be required to clear the arrears in the subsequent examinations within the stipulated time. A student may appear to clear the backlog in the

papers prescribed for semester I/III only in the odd semester examinations to be held in November-December. A student who wants to appear to clear the backlog in the papers prescribed in even semester II/IV may do so only in the examinations to be held in May/June.

- (h) The students who remain absent in sessional/end semester examination shall be deemed to have failed in that subject. In case of end semester examination, she/he may reappear in the failed course with maximum three attempts, as back paper examination, provided he/she pays the fees as prescribed by the University. In case of absence in sessional examination, she/he may reappear in the same semester in the immediate next academic session with a fee as prescribed by the University. Re-appearance in internal assessment for improvement shall not be allowed.
- (i) In case of practical examination/Dissertation/Field Reports the internal assessment will be based on the continuous evaluation (viva, performance in class test, maintenance of performance record, etc.) during entire semester. The internal assessment in such cases will be of 40 marks.
- (j) A candidate who passes the semester examinations in parts is eligible only for CGPA and grade but not for ranking of candidates in the University. Only the candidates who passes all the semester examinations in first attempts are eligible for ranking, when required.
- (k) There shall be no supplementary examinations.

STUDENT WELFARE

The University has a well-organized system for ensuring the welfare of its students. A Dean of Student Welfare Board is headed by the Dean of Student Welfare (DSW), who is assisted by Deputy Dean of Student Welfare in each Campus and several Assistant Dean of Student Welfare. The office of the Dean of Student Welfare is at 1st Floor of Student Activity Building in the Birla Campus, Srinagar. The University has provision of services and programmes to support and enhance the overall wellbeing of students. The DSW is responsible for providing students with need-based assistance and ensuring their general welfare as per the rules and regulations of the University including coordinating number of extra-curricular activities like cultural and sports events, extension, and outreach programmes. The DSW is also the Ex-Officio Chairperson of the Students' Council, and the DSW reports to the Vice-Chancellor of the University. Besides providing the basic facilities, the DSW office ensures implementation of many welfare schemes and programmes as follows:

SCHOLARSHIPS, STUDENTSHIPS AND FREESHIPS

The office of the Dean Students' Welfare of the University facilitates the students to avail a number of scholarships/studentships/freeships namely (i) National Scholarship Portal (NSP) which provide the common portal for various scholarship schemes of Central and State Government; (ii) National Fellowship and Scholarship for Higher Education of ST Students, Government of India, Ministry of Tribal Affairs Scholarship Division; (iii) Social Welfare Department of the respective State Governments in which the scholarships are granted to the bonafide students belonging to SC/ST/OBC categories on the basis of the annual income of the applicant's family. The University also facilitates the students in any other fellowships/scholarships being provided by their respective State Governments. Also, the DSW office issues the Bonafide certificate to the students for various purposes.

In addition to the above scholarships, the University provides financial assistance to BPL students from the Poor Students Assistance Fee depending upon the total funds available during an academic session. Further, dependents of ex-servicemen are eligible for the scholarship from the Soldier Board of their native district. Students falling in this category and desirous of availing this scholarship are advised to contact the Soldier Board of their respective home districts.

FACILITY OF RAILWAY CONCESSION

The regular students of the University are entitled to get concession in the fare to travel by railways under certain circumstances. The requisite application form for availing this facility may be obtained from the office of the DSW or the Director of the Campus. Duly completed application- forms countersigned by the Head of the Department concerned or the Warden should be submitted to the office of the Dean of Students' Welfare or the Director of the Campus at least 10 days prior to the date of the proposed journey for availing this facility. The purposes for which this fare concession is granted are as under:

1. Traveling to and from home town during long vacations.
2. Participating in educational, sports and cultural events organized or recognized by the Indian Inter University Federation.
3. Educational tours or visiting places of historic, artistic, and cultural importance.
4. Rendering service at times of emergency in the country or participating in collective/group programmes.

PRADHAN MANTRI VIDYALAXMI (PM-VIDYALAXMI) SCHEME

The PM-Vidyalaxmi Scheme was approved on 6th November 2024 by Govt. of India. It is a new Central Sector Scheme to provide financial support to the meritorious students so that financial constraints do not prevent any youth of India from pursuing quality higher education. This will facilitate and drive the extension of education loans to meritorious students who get admission in the top 860 Quality Higher Educational Institutions (QHEIs) of the nation (Indian campus of foreign education institutions, foreign campus of Indian education institutions and foreign education institutions will not be covered under this scheme) translating to covering more than 22 lakh students every year. This is consequent to budget announcement on education loan in the year 2024. Some of the key features about the scheme are mentioned here below:

1. Education loan under PM-Vidyalaxmi scheme is collateral free, guarantor free.
2. Loan applications will be made through a new simple, transparent, student-friendly and entirely digital application process <https://pmvidyalaxmi.co.in>
3. Loan amounts up to ₹ 7.5 lakhs get 75% credit guarantee by the Government of India.
4. Furthermore, for students with up to Rs. 8 lakhs annual family income, the scheme provides for 3% interest subvention on loans up to Rs 10 lakh.
5. This is in addition to the full interest subvention already offered to students with up to Rs. 4.5 lakhs annual family income under Pradhan Mantri Uchchatar Shiksha Protsahan Yojana Central Sector Interest Subsidy (PM-USP CSIS).
6. The Scheme is applicable for all Scheduled Banks/Regional Rural Banks (RRBs)/Cooperative Banks.
7. Students of all family income groups will be eligible to get this education loan, if they so desire.
8. Students admitted through open competitive examinations/merit based admission shall get this loan. Students admitted through management quota (or similar quota) will not be eligible.
9. Bank may take life insurance cover of the student borrower if the loan amount is above certain threshold, to be decided by individual banks. As per request of the borrower, the insurance premium can be included in the education loan amount.
10. If education loan amount is more than ₹ 10 lakhs, interest subvention shall be provided for disbursed total principal amount of loan up to ₹ 10 lakhs only.
11. It may be noted that as per the guidelines of the PM-USP CSIS scheme, students who are pursuing technical/ professional courses from approved NAAC accredited HEIs/ NBA accredited courses and whose annual family income is up to ₹4.5 lakhs, shall be eligible for interest subvention during moratorium period (course Period plus one year) for education loan up to ₹ 10 lakhs.
12. Students whose annual family income is between ₹4.5 lakhs and ₹8 lakhs shall be eligible to apply for 3% interest subvention for all degree/diploma courses in the QHEIs.
13. For degree/ diploma courses which are not covered in PM-USP, if the student is studying in the QHEIs covered in PM-Vidyalaxmi, the student will be eligible for 3% interest subvention, if the annual family income of the student is up to ₹ 8 lakhs.
14. Thus, PM Vidyalaxmi and PM-USP will together provide holistic support to all deserving students to pursue higher education in quality HEIs and technical/professional education in approved HEIs.
15. Student availing any other Central/State Government Scholarship or any other interest subvention scheme or Fee reimbursement shall not be eligible for availing benefits under this Scheme.
16. Interest subvention and credit guarantee under this Scheme shall not be available to those students who discontinue their course midstream, or who are expelled from the Institution on disciplinary or academic grounds. However, Interest subvention and credit guarantee would be available only if discontinuation is

due to medical grounds for which necessary documentation to the satisfaction of the Head of educational institution needs to be provided.

17. The responsibility of disbursing education loans will be on the respective banks who have sanctioned the loans. The Department of Finance (DFS), Ministry of Finance shall be monitoring the loan delivery by the banks.
18. Department of Higher Education, Ministry of Education shall be competent authority for interest subvention and credit guarantee under the Scheme.
19. The Canara Bank shall act as the nodal bank to coordinate the activities of PM-Vidyalaxmi with IBA, member banks and DHE.
20. STUDENTS' COUNCIL

In pursuance of the provisions of Statute 36 of the First Statutes of HNB Garhwal University 2009, the University is required to constitute a Students' Council in every academic session for providing students with a voice in the academic life of the University. The Students' Council shall consist of:

- i) The Dean of Students' Welfare who shall be the Chairperson there of;
- ii) Twenty students nominated by the Academic Council on the basis of meritorious performance in academics, sports and co-curricular activities;
- iii) Twenty students elected in the manner prescribed by the Ordinances framed under Statute 36. The council shall meet at least twice a year and consider matters of importance to students including programmes of studies, welfare of students and such other matters as may be deemed proper by the Chairperson. The Council shall also make appropriate suggestions to the concerned authorities on matters considered by it. Such students who may not be the members of the Council shall also have the right to bring before the Council matters which might be deemed to be important by the chairperson and shall have the right to be present in a meeting of the Council discussing the same. The affairs and meetings of the Council shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions contained in the ordinances framed under Statute 36.

However, in view of the decision of University Admission Committee Session 2020-21 held on 11.05.2020 the matter related to Student Council will be subject to the directions of UGC/MHRD/GOI from time to time.

PROMOTION OF SPORTS

The University focuses strongly on the promotion of games and sports. For this purpose, a Sports Board has been constituted. The Council makes special efforts to promote and encourage students to participate in sports and raising the sporting standards of the University. The board regularly organizes sports meet every year at Faculty, Campus, and University level. Students excelled in such events are rewarded with prizes and certificates. These certificates benefit them while seeking admission to higher classes in the University as well as earn weightage in procuring employment.

PROMOTION OF CULTURAL ACTIVITIES

The Cultural Committee consisting Members of Dean Students' Welfare Board and faculty members of the University is responsible for organizing and conducting the cultural and academic activities in three Campuses of the University.

NATIONAL CADET CORPS (NCC)

NCC training is being imparted to students in the University. The NCC Units of the Campuses come under the State Directorate of NCC in Uttarakhand headquartered at Dehradun. The control of the activities of NCC Units in Birla Campus, Srinagar and SRT Campus Badshahithaul is under 31 UK BN NCC Hardwar. NCC Group Headquarter of these units is at Roorkee. Male students studying in under graduate classes may join NCC and undergo a two-year training programme. NCC 'B' & 'C' Certificate holders are given due preference in admission to higher classes in the University and they are also granted due preference/ reservation in the recruitment to the Armed and Para military forces. Further information in this respect may be obtained from the Associate NCC Officers in the respective Campuses.

NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME (NSS)

The NSS Units in all three campuses of the University gives an opportunity to the students for undertaking social work. The scheme is implemented by Programme Officers working under the supervision of a Coordinator. Students of UG Classes are eligible for registering under the scheme. Students registering in the National Service Scheme have to participate in its activities for 2 years for obtaining the NSS Certificate. Two types of activities namely regular activities and special camps are organized under the scheme. Only such students who put in 120 hours of social work every year under routine activities for two years and attend at least one special camp are eligible for receiving the NSS Certificate. For the present, there are 05 units of the NSS in the Birla Campus, Srinagar; 01 unit in the BGR Campus, Pauri; and 03 units in the SRT Campus, Tehri with an intake of 100 students in each unit. Further details regarding the scheme and the method of registering under the same might be obtained from the Office of the Coordinator of the National Service Scheme in Birla Campus at Srinagar.

OTHER ACTIVITIES

FACILITIES, SERVICES AND SPECIAL ASSISTANCE

HOSTEL ACCOMMODATION

LIBRARY FACILITIES AND SERVICES

The university has a well-endowed lending library system consisting of a network of departmental and campus libraries supported by a Central Library located in the Birla Campus, Srinagar. The central library and various campuses/ departmental libraries are well-stocked and provide sufficient books to their members. The collection of the HNBGU Library system has more than 5.74 lakhs print documents, 2.64 lakhs e-books, 17383 e-journals, including 13806 e-journals covered under One Nation One Subscription (ONOS) w.e.f., 1st January 2025, 4 databases, 3 Anti Plagiarism Softwares (iThenticate, CheckForPlag, Drillbit) and one writing tool, namely Grammarly. The Central Library has a rich reference section holding many rare books. The subscribed e-resources of the HNBGU Library System can be accessed within the IP Ranges of all the libraries without any login credentials. These e-resources can be accessed remotely (Off Campus Access) and through a single-window search with the help of the HNBGU E-Library (through KNIMBUS Platform) and mobile app

(mLibrary) around the clock and worldwide with the login credentials provided by the Central Library. Central Library is a member of the Information and Library Network (INFLIBNET), Ahmedabad, Developing Library Network (DELNET), New Delhi, National Digital Library of India (NDLI), IIT Kharagpur and Sugmaya Pustkalaya, New Delhi.

Library automation is one of the significant activities of the HNBGU Library System. The Central Library is using KOHA Integrated Library Management Systems (ILMs). Central Library, Srinagar and Chauras Campus Library have also implemented RFID system integration with KOHA ILMs. The RFID Components include a Self-Check KIOSK (Issue/Return/Renew/Enquiry facility), a Book-Drop Station, a Security Gate with CCTV integration, and a Portable handheld reader (Wand) facility for tracking misplaced books. The ILMs is also capable of a web-based user-friendly interface and Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) cum Library Website (<https://library.hnbggu.ac.in/>), which can be accessed globally and around the clock. The various information, services, facilities, borrowing privileges, rules of library membership, and other instructions for students are available on the library website. The essential rules of the library are also printed on the reverse of the library membership form. All students are advised to read the rules carefully available on the library website and the library membership form and abide by them.

The HNBGU Library system has a robust digital facility with state-of-the-art ICT infrastructure. It has a high-end scanning facility that provides rare books, theses, and other documents to be digitized and preserved in machine-readable form.

HNBGU Library System is crucial in supporting the academic and research needs of students, faculty, and researchers. These services go beyond providing access to books and have evolved to encompass a wide range of resources and technologies. The value-added services of the HNBGU Library system include Reference and Research Assistance, Research and Subject Support Services, Adaptive and Inclusive Services, etc. HNBGU Library system is a member of INFLIBNET, Ahmedabad, and uploads HNBGU Ph.D. Theses to the ShodhGanga Portal regularly. For availing the library facilities, students are advised to submit the application for library membership.

MEDICAL FACILITIES

The University's Health Centre, located at Birla Campus, Srinagar is equipped with Four Bed Emergency Ward and a Dressing Room along with Ambulance Service. The Health Centre started in 1997 and was permanently established in 2004. It caters to the needs of all students and staff including regular check-ups, treatment of common diseases and providing medicines for general ailments. Facilities for Blood Sugar Test, Blood Pressure measurement, Haemoglobin Testing, Nebulizer compressor system, Oxygen concentrator, and T.T. vaccine is available in the Health Centre. Medicines are available free of cost to students and staff. Working with the aim of ensuring the physical and mental well-being of the university community, the centre also provides health advice and emergency assistance to the students, enabling them to continue their academic career uninterrupted. Besides, regular health camps for all the students and staff of the University are conducted along with Blood donation camps.

Health services are also being provided at the SRT Campus, Tehri, whereas, at BGR Campus, Pauri a position of Medical Officer is sanctioned. The medical officers and paramedical staff in the campuses are as follows:

FOREIGN STUDENTS OFFICE

MAINTENANCE OF DISCIPLINE AND CODE OF CONDUCT

The Proctor Board of the University is headed by the Chief Proctor and assisted by deputy and assistant proctors. The office of Chief Proctor is at the ground floor of Student Activity Building in the Birla Campus, Srinagar. The board is responsible for the maintenance of discipline in all the campuses of the University. A clearly defined and elaborate Code of Conduct has been developed and the observance of the same is mandatory for all students. Any breach of the Code of Conduct shall be deemed to be a breach of discipline and would render the defaulter punishable under the rules of the University. Therefore, students are advised to read carefully and abide by the Code of Conduct set out in this brochure and help to ensure the maintenance of a congenial environment for the pursuit of knowledge and a harmonious relationship among all stakeholders.

It is mandatory for all the students to submit their details duly filled in the form provided to the Proctor office. **In compliance of the 2nd Amendment in UGC Regulations, it is compulsory for each student and every parent to submit online undertaking every academic year at www.antiragging.in. The student will forward the received mail from anti-ragging website to the Nodal Officer of Anti-Ragging Committee of the University/College.**

The Code of Conduct to be observed by all students is as under:

THE CODE OF CONDUCT

Clause-1

Curbing Indiscipline and Misconduct by Students

The following acts on the part of students, individually or collectively, or in a group of two or more students or persons, shall amount to indiscipline and misconduct:

1. Physical assault, threat to use physical force, or any other intimidating behavior, within the premises of institution of the University system, or of any unit of any such institution, against any teacher, officer, functionary, member of any authority or unit, or other body, member of the non-teaching staff, or student of any such institution or unit, or a visitor present on official invitation or for administrative or academic work in such premises:
2. Causing disruption or disturbance in any manner in the teaching and other academic work, the working of libraries, laboratories, facilities and amenities, admission and examination processes, administrative working, and in any institution of the University system or any unit of such in situation.
3. The use of loudspeakers or any other sound amplification device in the premises of any institution of the University system, except where the proctor (in the case of the University) or functionary responsible for the maintenance of discipline (in the case of any such institution other than the University) has permitted such use for any educational, academic, co-curricular, literary, cultural or other extracurricular event.
4. Unruly and disorderly behavior during the course of any educational or academic excursion or tour, or at any event or competition relating to curricular, co-curricular or literary, cultural, sports or other extracurricular activities, or other social, educational or career-related programmes organized by, or in, any institution or more than one institution, of the university system, or any unit of such institution, whether within or outside the premises of any such institution or unit.
5. Any disobedience of, or dissent against, the awards or decisions of Referees, Umpires, Judges, or other adjudicators, officiating at any event or competition referred to in sub-clause (3).
6. Any act or statement, or distribution or display of any document or literature, including the circulars, pamphlets, posters, press releases, etc., which adversely affects the public image of any institution of the

University system, or of any unit thereof, or of any individual belonging to, or associated with, such institution or unit.

7. The possession and distribution of objectionable goods or materials.
8. Any act that creates, or tends to create, ill-will between groups of persons or promotes intolerance on religious, social, regional, or linguistic grounds.
9. Any act violative of the provision of the statutes, the ordinances or the Regulations of the University, or of the rules made there under.
10. The possession, display, use or threat of any weapon.
11. Any act that interferes with the personal liberty of another person, or subjects other persons to indignity, or involves physical violence or use of abusive language. Any violation of the provisions of the Civil Rights Protection Act, 1976.
12. Any violation of the status, dignity and honor of students belonging to the Scheduled Castes and the Scheduled Tribes.
13. Any act or practice, whether verbal or otherwise, that is derogatory of women or amounts to sexual harassment.
14. The making of false statements or the submission of false documents.
15. The use of the title of the University, or of any institution of the University system, or of any unit of such institution, for any organization or event, or in any communication or representation, without entitlement to such use, or for purposes not specifically authorized by the concerned institution or unit.
16. Any attempt at bribery or recourse to any corrupt practice, in any manner.
17. Any act that causes any loss, destruction, or defacement of the property of any institution of the University system or of any unit of such institution.
18. Any act amounting to unauthorized presence in, or entry or trespass into specified premises and areas, and any unauthorized retention or premises, of any institution of the University system or of any unit of such institution.
19. Any act that causes, encourages, or implies the interference of outside persons, organization or authorities in the functioning of any institution of the University system or of any unit of such institution.
20. Unauthorized collection of funds.
21. Possession, distribution or consumption of alcoholic drinks, intoxicants, narcotic drugs, and other psychotropic substances, and presence in the premises of institution of the University system or of any unit of such institution after such consumption
22. Any act involving moral turpitude
23. Any other act that is, in the opinion of the officers or functionaries of the university or any unit of the University system, unbecoming of a student
24. Any act of resorting to or abetting ragging, as defined in Clause 2.
25. Students shall avoid using cell-phones in the Campus; while, listening to music and sharing visuals on cell-phones or other electronic devices in the Campus is strictly prohibited.

Clause-2

UGC Regulations on Curbing the Menace of Ragging in the University

In view of the UGC Draft regulations 2009 and Supreme Court of India's letter No. 370/04/XIA dated 26 February, 2009 and March 17, 2009 the following provisions have been made by the University to curb ragging effectively in its campuses.

Ragging means the following:

Any disorderly conduct whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness any other student, indulging in rowdy or undisciplined activities which causes or is likely to cause embarrassment, annoyance, hardship or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in a fresher or a junior student or asking the students to do any act or perform something which such students will not in the ordinary course do or perform and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame or so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of a fresher or a junior student. Any of the above acts committed by any student of the same or junior or senior class shall be deemed to be ragging.

1. Punishable ingredients of ragging

- * Abetment to ragging;
- * Criminal conspiracy to rag;
- * Unlawful assembly and rioting while ragging;
- * Public nuisance created during ragging;
- * Violation of decency and morals through ragging;
- * Causing bodily harm, or injury or grievous injury;
- * Wrongful restraint;
- * Wrongful confinement;
- * Use of criminal force;
- * Assault as well as sexual offences or even unnatural offences;
- * Extortion;
- * Criminal trespass;
- * Offences against property;
- * Criminal intimidation.

Attempts to commit any or all of the abovementioned offences against the victim(s); all other offences following from the definition of "Ragging".

2. Punishment

Depending upon the nature and gravity of the offence as established by the Anti Ragging Committee of the Institution, the possible punishment for those found guilty of ragging at the institutional level; shall be any one or the combination of the following:

- * Cancellation of admission.
- * Suspension from attending classes.
- * Withholding/ withdrawing scholarship/ fellowship and other benefits
- * Debarring from appearing in any test/ examination or other evaluation process
- * Withholding results.
- * Debarring from representing the institution in any regional, national or international meet.

3. Tournament, Youth festival, etc.

- * Suspension/ expulsion from the hostel
- * Rustication from the institution for period ranging from 1 to 4 semesters
- * Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution
- * Fine of Rupees 25,000/-
- * Collective punishment: When the persons committing or abetting the crime of ragging are not identified, the institution shall resort to collective punishment as a deterrent to ensure community pressure on the potential raggers.

Clause-3

Establishment of Identity and Certification of Character

1. Every bonafide student of the University, irrespective of the Campus to which she/he might have been admitted, will be issued an Identity Card by the Office of the Proctor. The Identity Card issued to a student shall be treated to be the sole proof of her/his being a student of the University. It shall be mandatory for every student to produce the Identity Card upon being demanded by a member of the Proctorial Board. Failure in producing the Identity Card on demand will cause a student to be treated to be a trespasser and render her/him punishable under the rules of the University. The loss of the Identity Card should be reported to the Office of the Proctor and a duplicate Identity Card should be obtained from the said Office by making a formal application accompanied by a photocopy of the Fees Receipt issued to the student concerned at the time of admission and depositing the prescribed fees.
2. Character Certificates are issued to students on demand by the Proctor's Office. Often students applying for employers are required to submit an appropriate Character Certificate. The Character Certificate issued under the seal of the Proctor is considered to be the most appropriate proof of character. The students can be issued a Character Certificate as many times as they may require upon making a written application and the payment of the prescribed fees. However, students who might have been 'blacklisted' or might have been punished for a breach of the Code of Conduct or might have been guilty of indulging in ragging shall not be issued a Character Certificate.

DR. AMBEDKAR CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE (DACE)

Dr. Ambedkar Centre of Excellence (DACE) at the H.N.B. Garhwal University was established in the month of April 2022 by Dr. Ambedkar Foundation, Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Government of India. Dr. Ambedkar Centre of Excellence (DACE) scheme is to empower Scheduled Caste (SC) and Other Backward Classes (OBC) students in competitive exams by providing better opportunities for learning and excellence through quality coaching, personality development and acquisition of competitive skills. The Scheme is called, Free Coaching Scheme (FCS) for SC and OBC Students. A total of 100 seats have been allocated to the Dr. Ambedkar Centre of Excellence, H.N.B. Garhwal University under the Free Coaching Scheme for SC and OBC students by the Dr. Ambedkar Foundation, Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Govt. of India, New Delhi. DACE plays a significant role in the holistic development and nurturing of SC and OBC students.

The objective of the scheme is to provide high-quality free coaching facilities to the Scheduled Caste and Other Backward Classes students for the Civil Services examination conducted by Union Public Service Commission (UPSC) and State Public Service Commission (SPSC) competitive examinations. It empowers meritorious candidates through good quality coaching and fulfil the goal of enhancing their competitive skills. Stipend of Rs. 4000 (Four thousand Rupees) per month for full duration of the course not exceeding 12 months shall be paid to all the students by Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment, Govt. of India. Additionally, each student who succeeds in Central Civil Services/State Civil Services Exams for Class 1 and Class 2 posts will receive Rs. 15,000 as incentive for preparation of interview.

Eligibility Criteria for Selection

1. Only students belonging to SCs and OBCs, having total family income of Rs. 8.00 lakh or less per annum from all sources will be eligible for benefits under the Scheme.
2. SC/OBC candidates belonging to a Minority community may apply under the similar scheme(s) of Ministry of Minority Affairs, or the State Govts. as the case may be.
3. The student should have a valid Aadhaar number and a bank account seeded therewith, allotted to him/her. At the time of application, if the student does not have Aadhaar number, he/ she can submit his/her EID number. However, the payment shall be released only after obtaining the Aadhaar Number and shall be disbursed to the Aadhaar seeded bank account of the student only.
4. Income Certificate: Income declaration of self-employed parents/guardian should be in the form of a certificate issued by a Revenue Officer not below the rank of Tehsildar. Employed parents/guardians are required to obtain income certificate from their employer and submit consolidated certificate from Revenue Officer including any other additional source of income.
5. Students having less than 50% marks in their class XII exam, shall not be considered under the scheme.
6. The students/candidate must have a graduation degree from a recognized University/Deemed University/Institution established by law by the central government or state government.
7. A candidate appearing in the last semester or final year of graduation can also apply, but they must have a graduation degree at the time of admission to the program.

8. Benefit under the Scheme can be availed by a particular student not more than twice, irrespective of the number of chances he/she may be entitled to take in a particular competitive examination and irrespective of the number of stages in the exam. The student will be required to provide a declaration that he/she has not taken benefit more than twice under the Scheme or any other similar coaching scheme run by the Central or State Government.
9. The candidate shall be precluded from availing benefit under any other coaching scheme of the Centre or State Government and will be required to provide a declaration to this effect. A list of beneficiaries availing the scheme will also be uploaded on the portal of the scheme and shall be shared with Central University to avoid possibility of the candidate availing benefits of similar coaching scheme simultaneously or more than twice.
10. The selection of the candidates for admission to the DACE Scheme (i.e. UPSC/UKPSC CSE course) shall be strictly based on the merit.

Selection Procedure for Admission

The students will be selected through a Common Entrance Test (CET) conducted by the H.N.B. Garhwal University. The syllabus of the CET for admission in the DACE Scheme will be similar to the syllabus of the UPSC CSE Preliminary Examination General Studies (GS) and Civil Services Aptitude (CSAT) paper pattern. There will be 100 MCQs with one mark for each question (Total Marks 100, Exam Duration Two hours) from the following subjects.

- 1.Current Affairs of National and International importance
- 2.History of India and the Indian National Movement
- 3.Indian and World Geography
- 4.Economic and Social Development
- 5.Indian Polity and Governance
- 6.Environment and Ecology, Bio-diversity and Climate Change
- 7.General Science and Technology
- 8.Reasoning and Mental ability
- 9.General English
- 10.General Hindi

Category-Wise Ratio of Candidates

A total number of 100 seats are to be allocated. The percentage of SC and OBC students shall be 70% and 30%, respectively. In case of non- availability of adequate number of candidates in the SC category, the number of OBC Students may be enhanced. However, in any case, the number of SC Candidates shall not be less than 50% of the total candidates. Also, under each category, 30% of the slots shall be reserved for female candidates. In case sufficient numbers of female candidates are not available under any category, male candidates from the same category shall be considered.
